LEMPEREUR REACHES TOP OF HER ART BUT STILL OBSCURE

PARIS.—After 25 years in the-
atrical obscurity Madame Lempereur
has reached the top of her profes-
sion, but the public still will see
nothing of her.

Madame Lempereur is a theatre
promoter. She has been appointed to
officiate at the Comedie Francaise,
France's leading State theatre, oth-
erwise known as the House of
Moliere.

"A good promoter is as rare as
an actor with talent," said Andre
Antoine, manager of the Odeon,
second State theatre, where Mad-
ame Lempereur previously served.
"Many's the time my old comrade
has pulled me out of a hole. I was
only free from anxiety when she
was in the promoter's box."

**PUBLISHER OF BOOKS OF
DEAD HEROES REWARDED**

AMIEUS.—Publication of books
written by French writers killed in
action during the World War put
M. Edgar Mallere in financial straits
but it may obtain for him the de-
coration of the Legion of Honor.

The publisher ventured all his
fortune in posthumous writings,
which in part was a labor of love,
because Mallere's brother, an auth-
or of promise and a host of author-
friends, met death in war. Wishing
to provide a literary memorial to
them, Mallere got out expensive
collections. Their sales did not
reward him.

Former poets writers of France,
for the most part too poor to as-
sume the loss of their publisher
friends, have asked the minister of
fine arts to decorate Mallere with
the Legion of Honor for unselfish
and patriotic service.
