

EPISCOPALIANS SEEK BIG FUND

**Want to procure \$1300 to
Wipe out Final Debt
Against Church**

Thirteen hundred dollars, the sum necessary to free the new St. Paul's Episcopal church of debt, is the goal which members of the Episcopal church are busily engaged in raising these last few days, before Tuesday evening when a campaign committee dinner will be given at the home of Mr. and Walter M. West.

As will be remembered, Bishop Remington promised that for each dollar the local members raised he would give a dollar. The goal was set at \$3,500 and of this amount the \$1,300 is yet to be raised, the debt on the church being \$7,000.

January 24, the new house of worship will open and every effort is being made by the campaign committee to have the doors open with absolutely no debts.

At the election of officers held last evening, L. O. Mills was named as warden of the church; Allen Jones, secretary; Walter West, treasurer; Herbert Radcliffe, Mrs. Charles Martin, A. R. Parrish and Ivan Smith as members of the church committee.

Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Burke were chosen as delegates to the convocation of the eastern Oregon convention which will be held in La Grande, on February 12 and 13.

On St. Paul's day, which is the 25th of January, a ministerial banquet will be given at the White Pelican hotel to which all members of the ministerial association and the general public have been invited.

Rev. J. Henry Thomas is the pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal church and has taken an active part in the raising of funds for the new building.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15.—(AP)—The bid of 59 cents a cubic yard on the contract to grade the last section of the Reedsport-Scottsburg highway in the Umpqua National forest submitted by the Iver J. Roeten company of Portland was lowest among 22 received by the bureau of public roads district office yesterday. The road section is about a

mile long and estimates call for moving about 55,000 cubic yards. Contract award will depend on the outcome of an election on January 25 on the question of creating a highway improvement to cooperate with the bureau in building the road.
