COPENHAGEN, Jan. 16. (AP)—Madame Caroline Bjoernson, the "grand old woman of Norway," who has just celebrated her ninety-first birthday, a teetotaler for many years, has announced that she is going to have a drink of strong liquor now and then, "just to show her disapproval of prohibition."

"I hate interference and prohibition of any kind, and though I have never touched spirits I have made up my mind to have my schnapps from time to time, since

it has been prohibited in Norway," she wrote to her son, Bjorn Bjoernson, actor-manager of the Norwegian National theater.

Madame Bjoernson is the widow of Norway's greatest national poet, Bjoernstjerne Bjoernson. She is hale and hearty, and for years has taken an active interest in public affairs.

Former Soldiers To Lose Insurance

NEW YORK, Jan. 16. (AP)—Only six months remain for four million service men to renew \$20,000,000 worth of government insurance which they have dropped since the war. The chief co-ordinator of the United States Veterans Bureau for this area announced today.

Dependents of the service men in the next fifty years may lose more than \$20,000,000,000 unless the service men show more interest in the insurance, a statement said.

In New York state alone \$23,999 men have dropped \$3,000,000,000 worth of insurance.

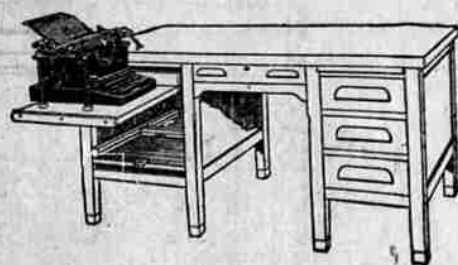
