

CHURCH DISPUTE GETS TO COURT

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 18. (AP)—Opening statements were made this morning in the circuit court at Jacksonville in the equity hearing between the Ashland Baptist church and the First Baptist church, Inc., for possession of the church property. The first witness would be called this afternoon. The suit is the result of a "divine healing" revival meeting held in Ashland in 1922, which resulted in case schism, that has been pending in the courts for 16 months.

Attorneys for both sides contended in the opening statements that each was following the bible in their teachings.

The plaintiffs are followers of the established Baptist church; the defendants adherents of the "Almae McPherson Four-Square Gospel," called Holy Rollerism, in legal documents filed in the suit.

The defense holds that it is in the majority in the church membership, and therefore entitled to control of the faith expounded, and that so-called "divine healings" beliefs are not detrimental to the practice of the Baptist faith, as the plaintiffs allege.

The dispute has been marked by several thrilling events, one being the seizure last July of the church by the established Baptist followers, after which they are alleged to have maintained a guard about the house of worship and to "have cut a peep hole in the door," as a protective measure.

Taking of testimony is expected to take all week, and will be devoted largely to recital of alleged over acts, and the fundamental principles of the opposing faiths.

Commission Criticized

Another "crack" at the state game commission was taken by the association; resolutions were ordered drawn opposing the alleged economy program of the commission. It was stated that although the commission found it necessary to lower the salaries of deputy game wardens and laborers at hatcheries and egg taking stations, it turned right around and raised the salary of the highest paid game and fish man in the state \$300 a year and at the same time took large business quarters in Portland in order to display stuffed birds and animals.

Dr. L. D. Gass and Nate Otterbren were nominated for the presidency of the association; C. S. Currin and C. Donart were nominated for treasurer and O. D. Mathews for vice-president.

A formal invitation was extended to the Oregon State Sportsmen's association to hold its annual meeting in Klamath Falls during February. Mathews was elected delegate to the meeting.
