

LUTHER TO LEAD GERMAN CABINET

BERLIN, Jan. 20.—(AP)—In preference to a dictatorship threatened by President Von Hindenburg, the leaders of the parties in the Reichstag have formed a cabinet.

Dr. Hans Luther again will head the new government as chancellor with Gustav Stresemann, holding his old portfolio of foreign minister. The former minister resigned early last month after the signing of the Locarno pacts in London, and efforts to form a new cabinet had been under way since then.

Von Hindenburg summoned a dozen Reichstag leaders to the executive mansion yesterday and told them that partisan chicanery and political barter must cease. He intimated plainly that the situation required either the setting up of a dictatorship or the formation of a parliamentary government.

"These sorry exhibitions of perennial government crisis must cease, as the condition of the fatherland more than ever demands constructive work," he told them.

Leaders of the middle parties are alleged to have been looking after party fences for the last six weeks instead of facilitating Von Hindenburg's attempts to construct a government which would be prepared to meet with numerous industrial and foreign problems with which Germany is confronted. Three hours after the political leaders had retired from the presence of the president, Dr. Luther made public the personnel of a cabinet which would be put before the Reichstag tomorrow. It includes three former premiers, Luther, Stresemann and Dr. Wilhelm Marx, who holds the justice portfolio.

DAMASCUS, Syria, Jan. 20.—(AP)—A force of rebels, numbering more than 300, attacked the village of Hamara north of Racheiya, today. Simultaneously the village of Carakolebikh, near Racheiya, was attacked but the attempt was repulsed. During the last few nights there have been no raids by the Druses around Damascus, but French troops have erected more barricades within the city.

DESIRE TO LIVE TOLD IN POETRY

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Seven lines of poetry represent a girl's desire to live.

Back on New Year's Eve, when the rest of the world was making merry, Lily Olson a Minneapolis waif, attempted self-destruction because she had lost faith in her poetic genius and was friendless and alone in the world.

But Lily is recovering, inspired more by the promise of Miss Harriet Monroe, editor of "Poetry," to publish some of her verse, than by many offers of a home, pretty clothes, trips abroad, and a college education.

Today the young poet's verse appeared—just seven lines of it. Dark lines, they are entitled and ending with a phrase that might have described her existence until now—"The world is strangely oblivious."

When Lily took poison in a street car, her shabby purse revealed but 13 cents, her total resources, and a morbid three-page message telling why she did not wish to live, and a silver medal—a prize from the Minnesota D. A. R. for a patriotic essay. Not without point, then, is the beginning of the first of her three poems, subtitled "Poverty"—"Hunger stalks like a gaunt leopard * * * down this gray street," and continuing:

"Dawn makes no prying revelations—

"Life is discreet.

"The houses stagger in drunken despair.

"Creaking maudlin sorrow.

"The ghosts that creep up that ancient stair, shall know no morrow."
