WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. —(AP)—Francis Walker, in charge of the federal trade commission's investigating into the Aluminum Company of America told a senate committee that the department of justice in-

quiring into the case apparently had not fully understood the question of price discrimination involved. The committee is seeking information whether the justice department diligently followed up the case against the company in which Secretary Mellon is a stockholder. Walker corroborated the testimony of other witnesses that the trade commission did not promise to keep confidential the evidence it secured from the company.

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Frank Farmer Again Licks Sugar Willie Keeler; Crim Is Winner Over Harrington

Joe Walters-Jim O'Dowd Almost Ends in Free For All; O'Dowd Awarded Decision When Walters Tries to Slug Referee For Interfering

Outfoxed but not outfought, Sugar Willie Keeler, picturesque behemoth of Kellogg, Idaho, was outpointed last night by the audient logger from the Grays Harbor country, Frank Farmer.

During the ten rounds, Farmer hit Keeler with practically every thing but the ring posts, but could not even stagger the big 210 pound slugger. And all the time Keeler bored in, hitting with both hands and scoring heavy body blows. A few rounds more, and it might have been a different story, for Keeler was obviously in the better condition.

Excluding the respective reputations of the fighters and the atmosphere which surrounds the fight, it was a rather plodding affair. Keeler fought a more aggressive fight than the last card but Farmer was not quite so anxious to mix at close quarters with the big boy. So the fight resolved itself into lumbering rushes by the heavy-weight with successful counters by Farmer.

Farmer in Danger Once, just once, Keeler had Farmer on danger street in the sixth round. The two rushed simultaneously and a series of right and left upper cuts to the body soon had Farmer hanging on and groggy. But the old master of the ring weathered the storm and came back strong in the next. That sixth round, and perhaps the tenth, were the only rounds Keeler won.

Keeler weighed in at 210; Farmer at 175. The crowd was in favor of the decision.

Wilbur Harrington and Jack Crim should never be matched again. Last night Harrington was clearly and decisively beaten by Crim in the semi-final of six rounds. It was a good fight, one of the best on the card, but there was no doubt as to who was the master. Crim was in control at all times. Crim weighed in at 140 pounds and Harrington at 135, but there was ringside talk to the effect that Crim was closer to 150 than 140.

Harrington is Fighter Give Harrington an opponent his size, a man who he can stand up to and slug toe to toe as he is wont to do. He is not at his best against a larger man. He is forced to spar a minute or so before he can slip inside and put one over. But with a smaller man, a lightweight, he puts up one of the most spectacular fights one can see any where.

As far as Crim is concerned, he is better every time he fights. He is faster, shifter and cooler, but he must develop a fighting heart. He is a fine winning fighter, a scrapper who piles up point after point, but let his opponent crash one

DEMPSEY-TUNNEY BOUT SCHEDULED

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. —(AP)—The Evening Telegram says today that negotiations are nearly completed for a heavyweight championship match between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney in July at Boyle's Thirty Acres, the Jersey City arena, controlled by Tex Rickard.

Crediting its information to a "reliable source," the Telegram says that Dempsey gave his "verbal promise" to Mayor Hague of Jersey City and Tex Rickard over the long distance telephone last week, after previously talking with Billy Gibson and Gene Tunney at Miami, Fla.

"No contracts have been signed."

It goes on, "but every detail has been agreed upon: In the event of Dempsey failing to live up to his agreement to box Tunney, the promoters will seek to fill in the date with a Tunney-Harry Wills contest."

The date suggested, July 4, falls on Sunday, so that the fight, if actually in process of arrangement, probably will be held July 3.

Noted Prelate Slowly Dying

BRUSSELS, Jan. 20. —(AP)—With life slowly ebbing and calmly awaiting the end, Cardinal Mercier still retains the spirit to do which gave him world fame when the Germans invaded Belgium and throughout the world war.

The aged prelate is seeking to bring about a union of the Roman and Anglican churches, a task he has been engaged in and praying for since the end of the war. Yesterday, despite the contrary desires of his physician, the cardinal discussed during a goodly portion of the afternoon with Abbe Portal, a missionary priest of Paris, the prospects for the success of the union.

The cardinal passed a relatively good night and his condition was unchanged. The physicians again expressed astonishment at the stout resistance the aged prelate is offering and the cheerfulness with which he faces the grave crisis.

"I want to live three months, to see accomplished the work of reconciliation of the churches which has always been so near my heart," he is said to have exclaimed just before his operation in December. Today he hoped again to confer on the subject with the churchmen of his arch bishopric.
