SAMOA BABIES ARE
THRIVING ON MILK OF
YOUNG COCONUTS

PAGO PAGO. (AP)—Young cocon-
uts for young Samoans is the ad-
vice of the United States government;
to South Sea mothers unable to se-
cure milk for their babies.

The use of coconuts for babies
is still an experiment, but so far is
considered successful. Each child is
given the meat of four very young
coconuts daily, together with all
the coconut milk he can drink.

Child welfare work in Samoa has
been organized so that all villages
in American Samoa are visited at
least once every two weeks. In each
village a committee of women has
been appointed. Babies are taken
to the weekly meetings of this com-
mittee. When a baby increases in
weight the mother is praised pub-
licly; when it loses, the mother is
called to account.

FINDS ABILITY WITH TOOLS
IS ASSET FOR INDIANS

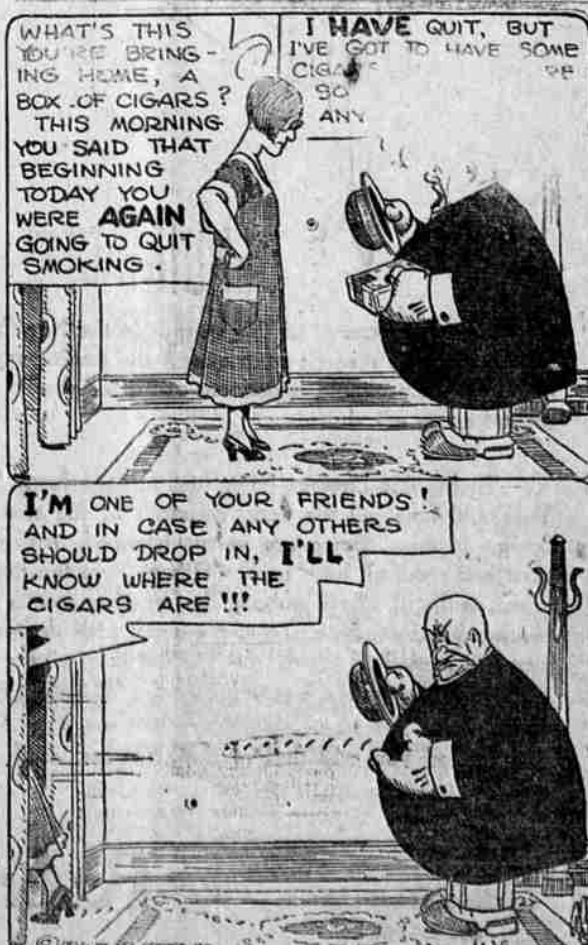
BISMARCK, N. D. (AP)—Innate
ability with machinery and tools may
eventually lead the American In-
dian to a new place in the sun, be-
lieves Clark B. Dickinson, head of
the government Indian school for
girls here.

During his 10 years in the Indian
service, Dickinson says he has found
that the Indian has an ingenuity and
an ability with tools which most
white men would envy. This is the re-
sult, he thinks, of long centuries in
which the Indian was compelled to
devise tools to meet his peculiar con-
ditions.

Indian boys make excellent au-
tomobile mechanics, he declares, and
many have displayed proficiency in
other trades where steadiness of
hand and accuracy of eye are assets.
