

COOPERATION IN BUILDING URGED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Joint organization of contractors with other employing elements of the building industry in order that guidance may be given to matters involving labor was proposed to the Association General Contractors of America in convention here today. The committee on labor, headed by F. L. Cranford, of Brooklyn, declared that responsibility to owners for whom operations are executed, as well as leadership in the building industry demands that ere long the associated contractors should take it upon themselves to effect some joint body.

"Our organization has no quarrel with labor either as an organized or an unorganized body," said Mr. Cranford's report, "but it is our conviction that the public and the construction industry should not allow the democrats of labor for more wages and inequitable working conditions to be made without study and conference before they are granted."

Numerous requests for advances in wages have been made during the past year and in practically every city of the country some of these have been allowed in whole or in part, says the report. "Highly organized as the American Federation of Labor is and also the local building trades councils, it can be expected that this pressure will ever continue. Likewise it can be anticipated that where the labor element exerts this pressure on the local industry almost wholly unorganized that their force will prevail over the unorganized force of the contractors. However, it is not anticipated that any significant increases over the country as a whole will be demanded or granted to the building trades in 1926."

Strikes have not been as serious in the past year as in previous years, the report pointed out, and the cause probably lies in the ever increasing understanding employers and employees and the presence of a board which is designed to hear impartially disputes and settle them.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Attorney General Sargent and his chief assistant, William J. Donovan, were recalled by the senate judiciary committee today for further examination concerning Mr. Sargent's memorandum of March 25, 1925, dealing with the department of justice inquiry into the practices of the Aluminum Company of America. The memorandum, addressed to Colonel Donovan, directed that there be no action or publicity in the case until a report had been made to Mr. Sargent. Secretary Mellon is largely interested in the aluminum company, which is charged by federal trade commission with violation of a federal court decree.

Another Cold Spell Starts

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Old Boreas, juggler of temperatures, did his famous mercury vanishing act today, and the northern section of the country, from the Rockies east to the Ohio, read thermometer in terms of minus, or near it. The Atlantic Seaboard is the next locale for the chilling spectacle, forecasters say. Lochinvar-like, from out of the west came he. As reports went eastward of 14 below, temperatures in Colorado and Wyoming, the cold wave area spread its borders. Blooming pussy willows in Montana had an icy shroud and other north-west points vied for the doubtful honor of being the coldest spot in the country. Hibbing, Minn., registered 26 below. Storm warnings were displayed in the great lakes territory and there was no promise of relief this week. Shippers were warned to protect perishable commodities against 29 below in the north and northwest, 15 below in the west and 10 below in the south. Zero was the minimum to be anticipated in the east. The southwest was not exempt. Snow and freezing temperatures were the lot of southwestern Texas, El Paso and the Panhandle. Near zero and a few degrees below were

forecast for the corn and wheat states.

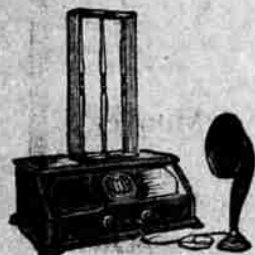
