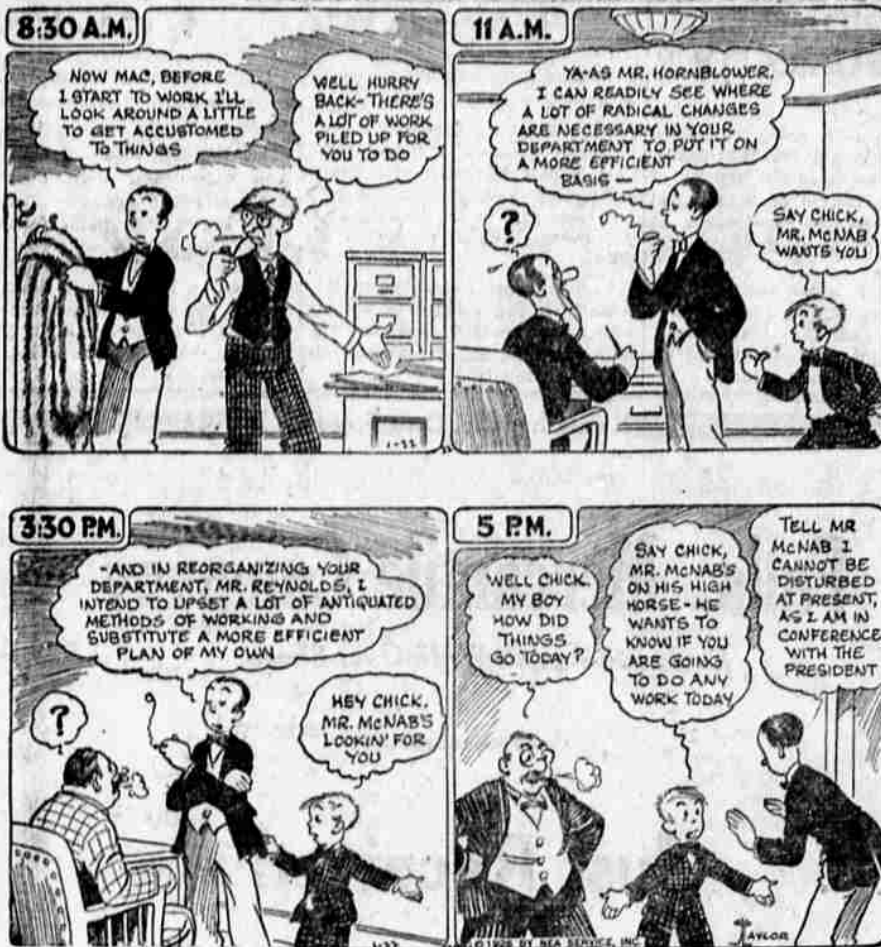

The police are continuing their widespread raid upon the homes of known communists and the number of persons arrested has reached 500.

The Alaska of the days of the Klondike gold rush; the lone prospector; miners, big and little and old and young; dance-halls and dance hall girls and hangers-on; mining camp types of all sorts; assassins, ships' officers and crews; incoming and outgoing passengers; newspaper correspondents and photographers—this is the locale and these are the people pictured in Charlie Chaplin's new motion picture comedy, "The Gold Rush," heralded by critics and experts as the greatest of all Chaplin comedies.

"The Gold Rush," is booked as the feature attraction for next Monday at the Liberty theatre and the film is claimed to be the funniest that Chaplin has ever made. The picture is in nine reels, and photograph experts declare the ninth has more laughs in it than the first, and that the first is better than any previous Chaplin laugh producer.

Chaplin portrays the lone prospector, and others in the cast are Mack Swain, Tom Murray, Georgia Hale, who has the leading feminine role, Malcolm Waite and Henry Bergman.

Turner are among those who stand out; but as usual the riding of Canutt himself is perhaps the outstanding feature. To see this real cowboy go through his paces makes all the rest of the movie horsemen look bad; and in the present picture he outdoes himself in sensational equestrianism and difficult feats. The story, written by Kingsley Benedict, has a mystery turn to the plot which makes it a thriller from the first foot. Suffice to say that a hooded night rider appears to arouse the whole country, leaving mysterious notes, always written on the ace of spades and always with a bullet hole shot thru the ace. There is plenty of action in "White Thunder," enough to satisfy the most insatiable appetite for speed.

Once Proud Ship  
To Be Destroyed

BALTIMORE, Md., Jan. 22. (P)—Trailing ignominiously at the end of a tow line, a once proud moni-  
tor and last of her type, was mov-  
ing toward her grave today, the U.  
S. Cheyenne was breaking her final  
sea. Her destination—a junk  
pile at Hampton Roads.

One of four sister ships, laid down  
in 1904, the Cheyenne, originally  
the Wyoming, started her death  
march along with the U. S. S. Owl,  
stealing ahead like a conscious  
sicken executioner. The Tallahas-  
see, the last of her sisters, felt the  
acetylene torch two years ago.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22. (P)—Work of surfacing the Dalles-Cal-  
ifornia highway (Fremont Trail) is
