stomach has failed me; there is nothing more the doctors can do" the prelate said to a priest at the bedside. The holy sacrament was administered. This prompted the cardinal to say:

"When my health was good, I always said I wished to receive the last sacrament, not when I was compelled to receive it, but while I could still receive it, and I feel a little better now."

Artificial nourishment was resorted to during the final days of the prelate's illness, but this method served its purpose poorly.

Leaves Sick-Bed

During his illness on January 16, the cardinal left his bed over the protest of his physician and conferred with churchmen concerning the Belgian flood situation. Abo he was deeply interested in the prospect of the Roman and Anglican churches, a movement in which he was the prime mover, and held numerous conferences on the subject in the sick chamber.

Special masses for the illustrious dead will be celebrated throughout Belgium and France tomorrow to mark the cardinal's passing.

Already there is talk of erecting a monument to the "reincarnation of the war-time soul of Belgium" by popular subscription.
