

Wants Farmers To Grow Beets

SEATTLE, Jan. 25. — (AP) — K. W. Timpson, state manager of the Utah Sugar company, is appealing to development organizations in an effort to interest King county farmers, east and south of Seattle, to increase sugar beet production. It was learned here today.

The sugar company last year at Bellingham built the first sugar beet factory in western Washington at a cost of \$1,000,000. The plant last fall handled 50,000 tons of beets, most of which were grown in Whatcom and Skagit counties. Timpson said his company wished to handle at least twice as many beets next fall.

Klamath Falls Shows Progress Equal to City Of Double Population — Open Winter To Speed up Operations This Spring

A home building boom which had no precedent last year in any Oregon town of 20,000 population or under, featured building construction in Klamath Falls during 1925. Because of this building boom, Klamath Falls residential district have expanded to "additions" which heretofore have been but sage-brush flats and barren hills.

In actual dollars and cents, residents of Klamath Falls dug down into their bank accounts and spent \$669,600 for the construction of new homes last year. The records show that an average of \$1431 was spent on each home.

Records available at the city hall reveal that during the 12 months of last year, 467 homes were built in Klamath Falls. Or, in other words, more than one home a day was completed each day of the 365. This far exceeds the record of 1924, which in itself had set a new record.

Fewer Shacks
Two features predominated in home building of 1925. One was that permanent homes, for the first time in the history of the city, exceeded temporary structures which served merely as a roof and four walls for a family which intended to make a bit of money and move on to what it considered a more favorable climate. The second feature was the steady and substantial development of outlying sections of the city, for years naught but a barren waste.

For the sake of expediency permanent homes are considered to be those of \$1,000 or more. All those under \$1000 are considered small frame structures of a temporary nature. Records reveal that of the 467 homes that were erected, 240 cost the owner \$1000 or more while 227 brought an investment of under \$1000.

BETTER SPIRIT PREVAILS
It is true that few of what one might term the "finer homes" were built. That is, the homes that cost over \$8000, one could count with the fingers of both hands. But nevertheless the hard and irrefutable records show that a new spirit it has awakened in Klamath Falls, a spirit of "build your own home and up to the middle of November."

Two Discoveries Arouse Interest

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. — (AP) — Two scientific discoveries with possible far reaching economic interest are under discussion today.

One is an announcement endorsed by the Scientific American, that two Dutch professors have succeeded in transmuting one element into another. The other is the statement of Dr. Hugh Scott Taylor of Princeton that the Chiffenn monopoly of nitrates is falling because of the use in the United States of modified iron catalysts, or dissolving agents, in their manufacture.

Doctors A. Smith and A. Karsson of the University of Amsterdam have changed pure lead into mercury and thallium, the Scientific American reports. This realization of an age-long dream of the alchemists is considered as verification of the recently advanced theory that the only difference between elements is in the arrangement and number of them in their atmosphere.
