

Roy Nickerson Wins Divorce; Suit Contested

A decree granting Roy Nickerson of Klamath Falls, a divorce from Suzanne Nickerson on the ground of desertion, was handed down late yesterday afternoon by Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt.

The suit was one of the few divorce actions that were contested in Klamath county during 1925. Mrs. Nickerson's stand in the case was taken by deposition. She was represented by Peter G. Nohff of Medford, Oregon. Mr. Nickerson was represented by W. S. Willey.

Another divorce suit was filed this morning by Georgia N. Sargent against Lloyd G. Sargent, charging cruel and inhuman treatment. The couple were married in April 1922. Mrs. Sargent asks for custody of their minor child.

City Officials Forum Will Be Held Tomorrow

Improvement Plans For 1926 Will be Outlined by Mayor

Just what the mayor and city council have in mind toward the improvement and development of Klamath Falls during 1926 will be told members of the chamber of commerce tomorrow noon at the chamber forum luncheon. It was announced today.

Mayor Goddard has accepted an invitation from the chamber to outline certain public improvement projects which he feels should be enacted as soon as possible. These improvements were included in his annual message to the city council.

The city council and heads of departments have also been asked to attend and will be called upon to speak a few words on their respective work for the city.

Charles Roberts, president of the council, will be asked to preside at the meeting.

"This is an annual affair," Secretary Sabin said today. "Each year one forum is devoted to the city officials, who are expected to tell us what are the plans of city administration during the coming year."

Overhead Span Is Favored By Rail Officials

Advocates Construction of 800 Foot Viaduct On 6th Street

That an overhead railroad crossing rather than an underground crossing on south Sixth street, would better serve the traveling public, was the opinion of F. C. Burckhalter, assistant general manager of the Southern Pacific company, yesterday afternoon. Mr. Burckhalter and a committee of business men, members of the Klamath Falls Industrial Improvement club, conferred on the proposed crossing project in Mr. Burckhalter's private car late yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Burckhalter supported his belief in the overhead crossing by blue prints and soon convinced local business men that his plan was the best under the circumstances.

Mr. Burckhalter's plan was as follows: To lower by three feet the Southern Pacific railroad grade; construct an 800-foot viaduct beginning from the south side of Spring street spanning the railroad and ending on the other side, almost at the extreme boundary of the Southern Pacific property.

That the project is still in its infancy was stressed by Mr. Burckhalter, who pointed out that Klamath Falls citizens must first pass on the proposition. Local business men who conferred with rail officials were J. A. Gordon, president of the First National Bank; E. M. Babb, cashier of the American National bank; A. J. Voye, vice-president of the Big Lake Box factory; W. O. Smith, of W. O. Smith Printing company; Joe McDonald, local merchant; Ed Martin, Martin Bros. Flour mill; and Junior Daggett, connected with the Ewanna Box company.

Committee Meets To Decide About Chamber Folders

To attract the tourist will be the main objective of the chamber of commerce Klamath folders which will be sent all over the west to tourist centers and information bureaus. J. A. Maddox is being mentioned with increasing frequency of late and he may be a factor to be seriously considered. Personally he laughs when the subject is mentioned to him. Maddox has strong personal friends in every part of the county. His well-known, inflexible honesty, his absolute fairness and his special qualifications give to his friends something that will make good campaign material. He has been a farmer, and a good one, and knows their troubles. He has been a contractor and knows what has to be met there, while he has also been a city property owner and knows the trials and tribulations of the municipal taxpayer.

Others Suggested

Then there are Dan Ryan, J. H. Pelton, Lindsay Simmore, Silas Obenchain and some more that the

people may have a chance to choose from.

The assessor's office is another subject for keen discussion. If "Bill" Lee runs for county judge—and all he needs is a little encouragement—then there may be a host of candidates for this office. Already the names of W. W. McNeely, Roy Oren, Maurice Johnson and George H. Walton are being discussed. McNeely would have strong support among the business men of the city. He would also find friends among the sportsmen, chamber of commerce and some of the other civic organizations that recognize the interest he has taken in public affairs. Oren would have a big following among the younger people of the county, as well as among the old timers. He is a young man who has carved out his own way and made a success of whatever he has gone into. Walton will develop strength from all sections of the county, particularly in Klamath Falls, the Klamath Valley, Merrill and Malin. His friends claim that he would carry the Merrill-Malin vote almost solidly, for his record while in charge of the Merrill bank was such as to make friends of the people living in that section. Of course, if Lee does not run for county judge he will be a candidate for assessor, as he has such an insatiable appetite for public office.

For District Attorney

For district attorney four names are mentioned—Ashurst, Jones, West, and Wiley. It is understood that Elliott will not be a candidate for the office and would even resign if it did not appear that he was stepping out while under fire. If all four make the race, it will be interesting. Among the democrats Duncan is a strong favorite, but it is understood he will under no circumstances consider it.

For commissioner most of the names associated with the office of county judge are also mentioned. It is understood that Martin has had all of the honor of being a county official he wants and gets a murderous gleam in his eye when anyone mentions politics to him. Indications strongly point to the candidates for county judge and commissioner coming from the country this time, a contingency that would not be objectionable to the people of Klamath Falls.
