BOARD INDORSES PLAN TO SECURE 20,000 FOLDERS

Four Items of Expense of Advertising Committee Are Approved Today

Four expenditures of the community advertising committee, amounting to \$883, were indorsed this noon by the chamber of commerce board of directors. The board considered each expenditure justified and would bring valuable advertising to the Klamath country.

The largest item was one of \$600 for 20,000 tourist folders. The other three items were as follows: \$50 for two pictures of Crater Lake and the Klamath country which will be hung in the Southern Pacific ferry, "The Klamath" which plies back and forth across San Francisco bay; \$200 for two additional films of the Origin of Crater Lake; and \$33 which is Klamath's share of a folder put out by Oregon and northern California towns, to advertise the proposed The Dalles-Reno-Los Angeles highway.

Support Sportsmen
The chamber of commerce indorsed the move of the Klamath Sportsmen's association to attempt to secure the annual convention of the Oregon State Sportsmen's association in Klamath Falls next February.

Four resolutions passed at a southern Oregon advertising meeting in Ashland were indorsed by the chamber with one exception, that which advocated the lowering of the limit on game fish. It was thought this resolution should be referred to the Klamath Sportsmen's association.

Announcement was made that the chamber of commerce membership plaques had arrived and that all members should call for their signs within the next few days. Fred Fleet, who was in charge of the plaques, suggested that each member hang their sign up in a conspicuous place in their offices.

Collier Represents Klamath
A. M. Collier, president of the chamber of commerce, will represent Klamath at the state chamber of commerce annual meeting in Portland next week. It was announced by E. M. Bubb, acting chairman of the meeting. Mr. Collier is now in Eugene. Mr. Bubb said, conferring with Eugene authorities on the railroad celebration late next summer.

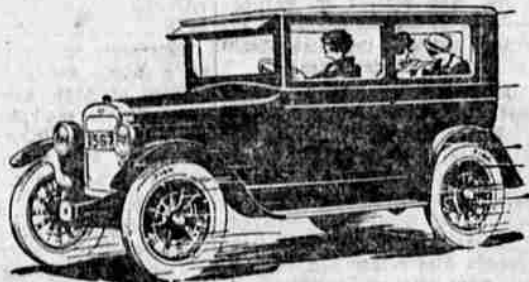
