Training Camps Located in Oregon
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 27. — (AP) — For the first time since the close of the world war all training camps for Oregon troops will be within the state this year, according to Brigadier General Geo. A. White, adjutant general of the state, who returned yesterday from Washington, D. C., where he attended a conference of military officials.
Instead of going to Fort Barry, San Francisco, the Oregon artillery will train at Fort Stevens, which is to be improved for the purpose. Camp Jackson, near Medford, will again be used by the infantry troops. A force of regular army infantry will also be sent to Camp Jackson and a small artillery force to Fort Stevens in addition to the Oregon troops. It is estimated that 3,000 officers and men will train at Camp Jackson. Both camps will be open the latter part of June.
An increase in the national guard units for Oregon was authorized at the Washington meeting, the first to be allowed in two years on account of shortage of federal funds for the purpose.

GENERAL WOOD'S SON SOUGHT BY FLORIDA POLICE
SENSATIONAL SPENDTHRIFT BELIEVED TO HAVE PASSED BAD CHECKS
HAVANA, Jan. 27. — (A.P.) — Osborne Wood, son of Major General Leonard Wood, at the hotel Biltmore today said he knew nothing of charges against him of passing worthless checks in Florida and declared that he would go immediately to Palm Beach to straighten out matters.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Jan. 27. — (AP) — Former Lieutenant Osborn Wood, son of Major General Leonard Wood, governor general of the Philippine Islands and whose meteoric financial and marital adventures are widely known, today was being sought by officers of Palm Beach county on charges of having passed worthless checks. Miami hotels were searched and a sharp lookout is being kept along the south coast of Florida.
The charges were filed by the Palm Beach National Detective agency late yesterday with the sheriff. The agency said it had information that Wood had left for Havana and that it has asked the prefect of police of Havana to refuse Wood admittance to Cuba.
Warrants Today
Sheriff Bob Baker early today said Charles Reed, head of the detective agency, would swear out formal warrants today for Wood. The information came to the sheriff yesterday after the office of the prosecuting attorney for Palm Beach had closed for the day. Reed refused last night to make known the amounts of the checks or the names of the persons to whom they are alleged to have been given.
Reed informed Sheriff Baker that Wood left the Royal Poinciana Hotel, where he had been staying since last Christmas Eve, for Key West on the Florida east coast railway, taking the regular Havana boat at Key West for Havana. Reed also said that he had asked the Key West police to arrest and hold Wood in case he returned there after being refused admittance to Cuba.
Nearly Broke
Wood came here last March, reported to be nearly broke, having been sent here by a Tampa real estate concern as a salesman. After a few weeks of active social life he went to New York saying he was going to buy some clothes. On his way back he stopped here for a few days at Wilmington, Delaware, where his wife was granted a divorce from him.
Returning here Christmas Eve he resumed his real estate business and social activities.
Investigation here last night revealed that he bought three tickets to Havana. The names of his companions were not revealed.
