YREKA MAN WINS LONG STRUGGLE

enough capital to bring his flock to his adopted land again.

Agostin went to McCloud in 1914 and entered business there; in 1916 he again made application for first papers, his original proceedings being voided by the lapse of time. The great war broke out and he lost track of his family for several months, finally relocating his wife and children through federal circles, where interest was created by the fact that three of the Agostin children were American citizens.

Falls Again

When the armistice was signed, Agostin appeared for his final papers here in 1921 but he found that the immigration laws had been changed and that the yearly quota from Hungary had been exceeded without the entry of the Agostin family on the eligible list. He wanted his citizenship papers so that he might be a bona fide citizen as well as to bring his wife to America, a right he would have if he had his papers.

Maxwell Lambie, federal naturalization examiner of San Francisco, opposed the granting of the papers on the grounds that Agostin primarily wanted his papers to bring his wife to this country, a subterfuge, he claimed, to avoid the immigration laws. So Mrs. Agostin and her three American born children and the Hungarian born child were forced to remain in Hungary until two of the American children were old enough to join their father here.

Agostin, denied his papers in June, 1925, and instructed to appear here at the Saturday hearing, was on hand with his attorney, James R. Tapscott, who has patiently fought Agostin's legal battle to an end.

Sends for Family

Before noon, Agostin had taken the oath of allegiance to the United States and he immediately forwarded transportation to the family he has not seen for many years. It is probable that Mrs. Agostin and the two children abroad will join Agostin at Oakland in early spring.

In addition to Agostin, the United States received five new citizens as the result of the hearing. Three applicants were denied their papers, two for further study of American civics and one for too intimate relations with intoxicating liquor.

Siragelos Jongsanatos of McCloud, native of Greece, was denied his papers with prejudice and his hearing was continued for five years. Jongsanatos admitted that he had paid a fine in federal court for violating the 18th amendment and he also admitted that he was under

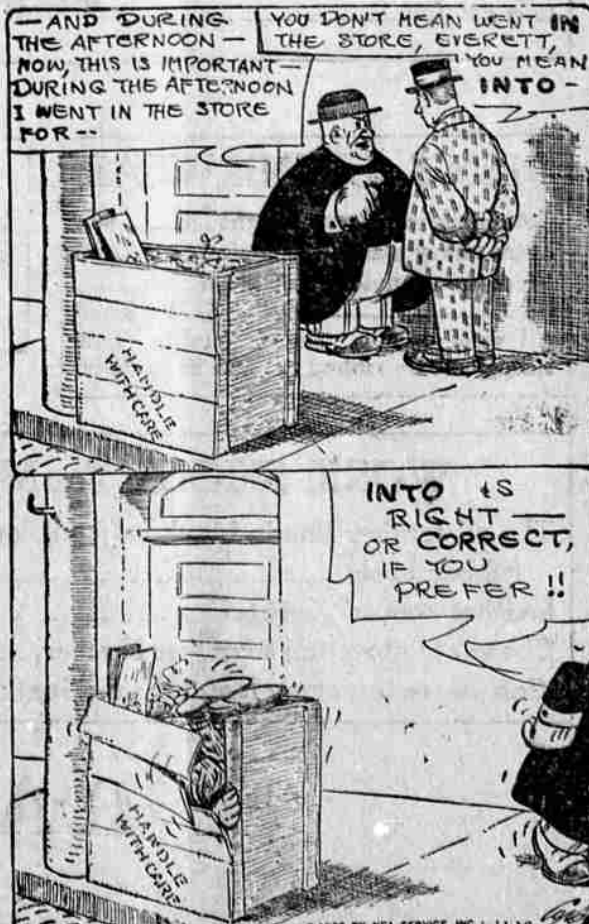
ASSASSIN THWARTED
