EXECUTIVES ASK INSTANT RELIEF

Claim There is "Dynamite" in Agricultural Situation in United States

DES MOINES, Iowa, Jan. 28. (AP)—The governors of three states and personal representatives of eight others today demanded immediate relief for the agricultural situation at the corn area conference and Governor John Hammill, of Iowa, chairman, appointed a resolution committee to draft demands for congressional aid.

"There is enough dynamite in this agricultural situation to change the political way of the country," William Pirih, Columbia, Mo., farm editor and chairman of the corn belt committee told the conference. "Far greater than the law of parsimony, is the law of self preservation," he said in prophesying that unless the tariff wall is extended to guard agriculture, the farming interests "will have no alternative than to declare war on the whole protecting system."

Pirih expressed impatience with this "twaddle" about the "sacred white ox," known as the law of supply and demand. This, he asserted, was ruthlessly set aside years ago when the tariff system was adopted.

CRACKER'S WEEK HELD IN NATION

Different Uses of Broth to Soup is Discussed at Length in Article

From soup to nuts, serve crackers! This week is cracker week when all good housekeepers are supposed to look to the cracker box for culinary inspiration.

The newest style in cracker boxes is the family size in wax-wrapped form. Keep the crackers in the warming oven or near the radiator and they will stay crisp.

Crackers need no fancy touches when served with the soup, but in the interest of labor saving, crackers may be used as the foundation for olive canner or sardine canapes. But a package of prepared pimento or of pizza. Chill cheese in the pastry tube, force out on salted crackers in stars and roses and leaves and you have a quick but tempting tidbit to serve with salad or with end of the dinner coffee.

Various Uses

Salted crackers are the ideal background for all sorts of fancy fillings. Next time you have a bit of boiled icing left from a cake, use it on salted crackers, dusting the top with finely chopped nuts or fine coconut, and there are little frosted cakes for after school lunch and after sewing tea.

A mixture of sugar, butter and vanilla or lemon juice run through the pastry tube or spread with a spatula on crackers is quick to serve with ice cream. By coloring pink and green and yellow you can get roses and leaves nice enough to serve at your party.

Quick to Spread

Melted chocolate is quick to spread on crackers. For four layer sandwiches spread melted chocolate between crackers, sprinkling with walnuts, top with chocolate and a half walnut and serve with tea or dessert.

Peanut butter mixed with canned milk, a pinch of salt and confectioner's sugar to make a firm frosting, makes cracker sandwiches that will please the children especially. These are just the thing for a tea party because a little girl can make them herself.

President Of State Chamber Opens Meeting

Vining Sees Harmonious Development Program

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28. (AP)—That business leaders of the state have united in a practical harmonious working agreement on a state development program, and that the carrying out of this program will result in wonderful development of Oregon in the next few years, was the assertion of Irving E. Vining, of Ashland, president of the Oregon state chamber of commerce, at the annual meeting of that organization which opened here today.

Delegates from every section of Oregon were present and the day was devoted to discussions of problems of the organization and of plans for cooperation of the development activities.

Mr. Vining said that land settlement work is one of the most important phases of the work outlined. He warned the delegates that they should not let the speculative settlers fall into the hands of selfish real estate men whose only ambition is to make a sale and as large one as possible. But that committees should be organized to take charge of newcomers and to see to it that they are given opportunity to purchase land within their means and which will be suited to their line of agriculture.
