SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28. (AP)—John Fehlen and Arthur Spaulding, convicted of violating the prohibition law in Umatilla county and who have served a year each in the county jail at Pendleton, were granted reprieves yesterday by Governor Pierce. The reprieves eliminate the fine of \$1500 assessed against each of the men. They have served out their jail sentences and have no money with which to pay their fines. Umatilla county authorities recommended the reprieves.

ROSEBURG HAS WEATHER FREAK

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 28. (AP)—A weather freak was recorded at the local United States Observatory last night when the temperature fluctuated more than ten degrees in a period of 30 minutes. Yesterday afternoon at 4 p. m. the temperature was 41 degrees. This gradually increased to 50 degrees at 7:45, when the thermometer shows a sudden rise to 60 degrees at 8 p. m. At 8:10 p. m. the temperature had fallen again to 50 degrees, remaining near that point throughout the night. Light showers fell all night and at 5:30 this morning a heavy rain started, lasting for about two hours.

LOST POEMS OF AZTECS LOCATED

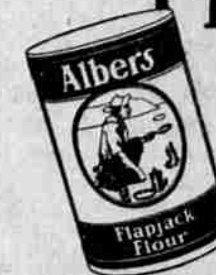
Declare Poems to Be Surprisingly Perfect; Ancient Prince Is Writer

CHICAGO, Jan. 28. (AP)—Discovery of more than 500 poems in three volumes belonging to the "lost literature of the Aztecs", the loss of which scholars have lamented for centuries, was announced in a copyrighted story from Mexico City in the Chicago Daily Tribune today.

"The poems are surprisingly perfect," the Tribune says. "Their poetical form is largely trochee, or the meter of 'Hawthorne'."

"One volume contains 47 meterical stories in Aztec, which Aztec pupils learned in school and heathen temples before the white man set foot in America. Another contains 230 songs in Aztec under the title 'Cantares Mexicanos,' or Mexican songs and dance choruses, in which hundreds of persons joined. "Among the most interesting of the songs are several written by the poet, Prince Nezahualcoyotl, king of Texcoco."

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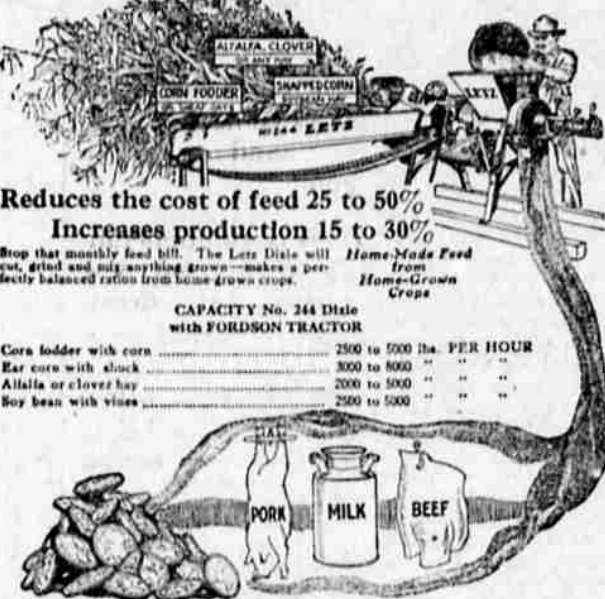
