AQUITANIA HITS NEW YORK PIER

**Atlantic Storm Declared to
be One of Longest and
Worst in History**

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—(AP)—A
stiff wind today caused the liner
Aquitania to crash into her pier
while trying to dock. No serious
damage resulted. The big liner
was two days late because of the
storm.
"There is no worse weather than
we have had on this trip," said Sir
James Charles, commander. "We
had a whole gale for 72 hours on
one stretch. The longest I have
ever known."
At times the Aquitania was obli-
ged to reduce her speed to five or
six knots. The lowest day's mileage
was 92. The only damage was to
two port holes on the starboard
side.

QUESTION POWER OF QUARANTINE

**Validity of Order of Wash-
ington Official to Stop
Imports is Argued**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—
The validity of a quarantine order
of the director of agriculture of the
state of Washington, regulating the
entering into the state and trans-
porting through it by railroads of al-
falfa hay, coming from Utah and cer-
tain portions of Idaho, Wyoming,
Colorado, Oregon and Nevada, was
argued today before the supreme court
in the case appealed by the Oregon-
Washington Railway and Navigation
company. The state contended that

law and was issued on the theory
that alfalfa hay originating in the
banned districts was presumptively
infested or infected with weevils, their
eggs, larvae, etc., and that the state
law prohibiting railroads from ship-
ping such hay through the state oth-
erwise than in sealed containers, was
a valid exercise of state authority.

The order was attacked on the
ground that congress alone had power
to regulate commerce among the
states. It was insisted that the sec-
retary of agriculture had authority
to prevent the spread of plant dis-
eases and that the matter was ex-
clusively in the control of the fed-
eral government. The order was al-
so assailed as arbitrary and embrac-
ing extensive territory from alf-
alfa weevils.
