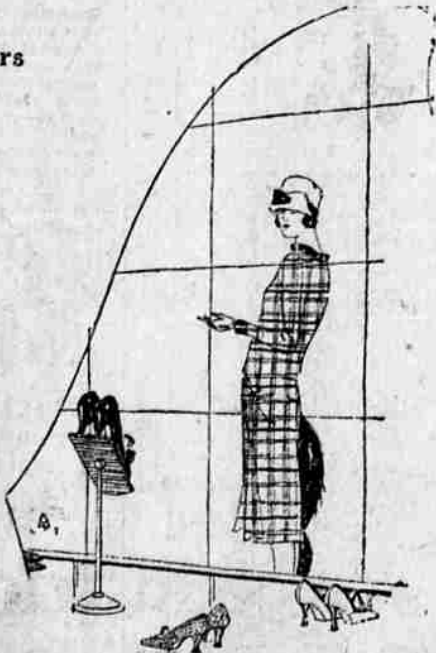

Missing Watch
Found In Home

Lester DeLow And
Wife Held as Theft
Suspects

A gold wrist watch stolen from Mrs. Howard Kincaid at the Lee apartment was found by police last night in a search of the home of Lester DeLow, according to Chief of Police Loucks. Articles of silverware which also were stolen from Mrs. Kincaid have not been recovered.

Mrs. Kincaid yesterday noticed that a tray of her trunk had been taken from the trunk and placed on an attic shelf of the Lee apartments. Suspicious that something was wrong, she made an investigation and found that her silverware and gold wrist watch were missing.

Mr. Kincaid suspected that DeLow might have some knowledge of the affair, and swore out a search warrant on DeLow's home on Martin street. The wrist watch which he identified as his wife's was found on a dresser table during the raid.

Police arrested DeLow and wife and E. L. Barnes, said to be an employee of DeLow, and are holding them on an open charge pending further investigation.

Police denied they had found any other suspected stolen articles in the DeLow home.

ROCK DECLARED
CAUSE OF WRECK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(P)—A rock rolling down from the hillside above the railroad track was the cause of the wreck October 19, 1925, at Blalock, Oregon, in which one man was killed and 24 persons injured, safety inspectors who investigated reported today at the I. C. C. A heavy rain loosened the boulder from its position several hundred feet away from the track, the report asserted. Bounding down, the stone struck the rail with such force as to bend the steel sharply out of line and was itself smashed into three pieces which rolled on downward.

A few minutes later the passenger train hit the spot at full speed and immediately left the rails. The trail of the traveling rock was easily discernible after the wreck, the inspectors declared.

BRUTAL SLAYER
THREATENS TO
TAKE OWN LIFE

Murderer of Anna Dietrich Is
Turned Down by Wife;
Would End It All

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 28.—(P)—David L. Marshall, confessed slayer of Anna May Dietrich, has threatened to take his life and is under guard in the hospital at Moyamensing prison.

His threat was revealed today by officers who accompanied him to the prison yesterday after he had been held without bail for the action of the coroner. He was said to have made the threat when a detective who had visited the prisoner's wife returned with confirmation of the report that Mrs. Marshall would not aid in his defense or have anything further to do with him.

"That's the last straw," Marshall told the detective. "What's the use. I'll be frank enough to tell you that I will end my life at the first opportunity."

Orders were sent to the prison at once to place a special guard over the prisoner.

Old License Tags
Void After Sunday

Those little yellow license tags of 1925 vintage will be passed after Sunday night, according to orders received by local officials last night from Salem, and starting February 1 all cars which have not been equipped with 1926 licenses will not be allowed to operate. According to data, it would appear that three of the greatest men in the history of this country, Washington, Lincoln and Columbus, were all long fellows.

Columbus was six feet four inches in height, Washington six feet two and Lincoln six feet six, the tallest by two inches, measured in his stocking feet.
