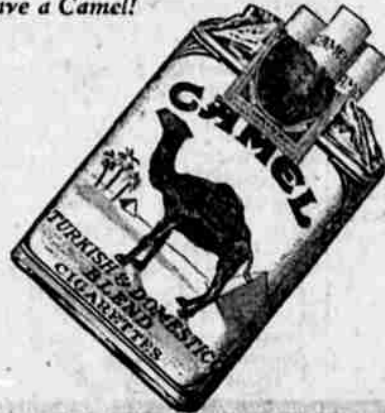

"By early June we hope to have begun actual marking of the battlefields and other historic spots," said Captain Applegate yesterday.

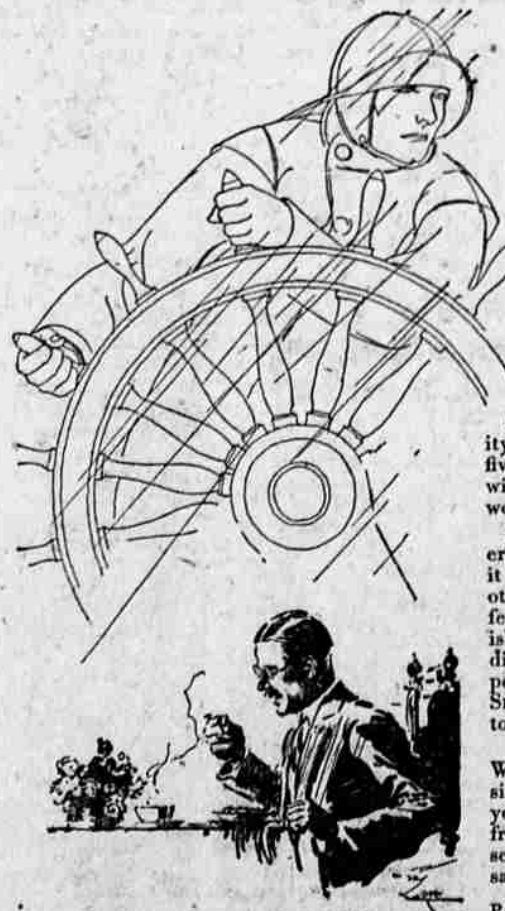

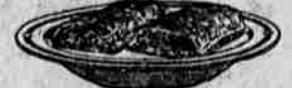
