

U. S. GRIPPED BY BIG STORM

Shipping on Atlantic and Pacific in Jeopardy; Suffering in Chicago

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Across continental United States from coast to coast the forces of winter rain riot today with respite promised only for the middle section. In the face of heavy gales on the Pacific, shipping battled mountainous seas and raced for shelter. Sweeping eastward the path of the cold wave was marked with deep snows, blocked highways, impeded trains and sub-zero temperatures that caused num-

erous fires and intense suffering in large cities. In the east, sections reported the coldest weather of the season. Lake Michigan saw the most determined effort of the day to defeat the elements. Army airplanes were enlisted in the efforts to rescue five of eight men stranded for three days on two icebound fishing tugs off Muskegon, Michigan, after three of the crew escaped over the ice floes to shore with the direful story of their comrades' plight. Coast guards who helplessly watched from shore said last night the steamer Alabama, which went to the rescue of the imprisoned tugs, had approached near enough to give the men food and fuel. Two army pilots from Selfridge field were ready to drop cans of food and forty pound cartons of coal on the craft today.

Suffering in Chicago was increased by numerous fires, which drove forty families to the streets. A

water main burst and engulfed a street with thousands of gallons of water, freezing automobiles to the pavement, turning basements into skating rinks and putting out furnace fires for blocks.

Firemen in New York City had their helmets frozen to their shoulders. The Metropolis had the coldest weather of the season with the mercury at five above zero and an 84-mile gale blowing, but no snow.

BATTLE SNOWS FOR MATRON'S LIFE BUT LOSE

Last Trip of California Pioneer, from Mountains, Hazardous and Daring

YREKA, Calif., Jan. 29.—Battling their way through the snow blocked roads of the Sierras with a dying matron of the bleak region on a chair equipped sled, men of the mountains fought a game but losing joust with death for the passenger died at the Weed hotel Tuesday afternoon.

She was Mrs. Alice F. Daggett, aged 78, widow of John Daggett, former lieutenant-governor of California, superintendent of the federal mint at San Francisco for many years and twice owner of the famous Black Bear mine.

Stricken With Flu

Mrs. Daggett, who had been in failing health for several months, was seriously stricken by influenza and Sunday it was decided to take her to Weed for medical treatment. Men of the Black Bear neighborhood, where Mrs. Daggett had made her home for many years, equipped a sled with a chair and Mrs. Daggett bundled in robes, was placed in the chair and for miles she was taken over the snow covered roads to where an automobile was waiting. She was accompanied by a daughter, Miss Leslie W. Daggett, and the little party was joined at the meeting place by Mr. and Mrs. William Schneider, who motored Mrs. Daggett and her daughter to Weed.

Sinks Into Stupor

Mrs. Daggett was taken to the Weed hotel, where she gradually sank into a stupor from which she was never revived.

Romantic Trip

Mrs. Daggett's life in Siskiyou reads like a romance for she came to California and settled at Sawyers Bar when she was 13 years old. Later she married John Daggett there while Daggett was owner of the Black Bear mine, one of the most famous gold deposits uncovered in northern California. After several years of development work, Daggett sold the mine to an English syndicate and this organization wrested approximately five million

Pierce Continues To Grant Pardons To Liquor Vendors

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Conditional pardons were granted by Governor Pierce yesterday to Frank Friend of Multnomah county and to John Sukurski of Coos county, both serving county jail sentences for violation of the prohibition law. On the advice of doctors, Friends was relieved from prison a month ago. In addition to his jail sentence he paid a fine of \$300. Sukurski was conditionally pardoned upon request of Coos county authorities. He served 60 days and has a fine of \$250 to pay in installments.

Ex-Warden Files Expense Account

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—The expense account of A. M. Dalrymple, former Warden of the state penitentiary covering his trip to the convention of the national association of prison officials last fall was filed with the secretary of state yesterday in the sum of \$337.53. Dalrymple attended the convention and visited several southern prisons, but was relieved of the wardenship by Governor Pierce the day after his return home. He is now an investigator for the state fire marshal. His expense account for the southern trip is not considered excessive.

Concrete Work on S. P. Tunnels To Begin Soon

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—The contract for the concrete work on all of the tunnels of the new Natron cut-off of the Southern Pacific over the Cascade mountains between Eugene and Klamath Falls has been let to the Utah Construction company according to announcement by railway officials. 500 men will be at work 30 days or more on the contract it was stated.

Mrs. Charles Davidson of Dunsmuir, sister-in-law of Mrs. Mae Coatsney of Yreka, lived with Mrs. Daggett for many years and considered her as a mother.

To comply with a last wish made by Mrs. Daggett, her body was sent to Sacramento yesterday where it will be cremated.
