George Biehn of Portland, one of the extensive property owners of Klamath county, will arrive in the city from the north tomorrow, to attend business matters here.

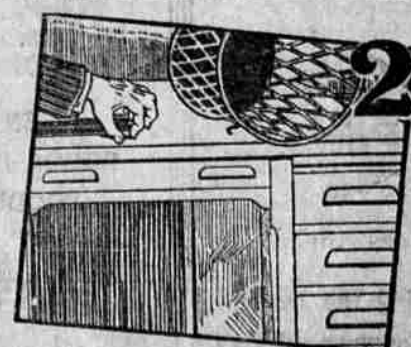
Upon his return north the end of next week he will be accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. M. Lucas and her son, and Miss Frances Humphrey, his niece.

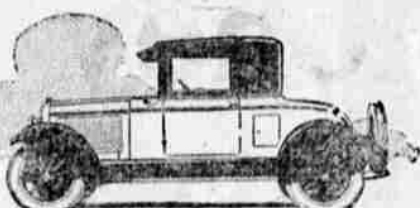
