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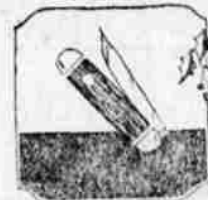
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HELEN HAS HARD MATCH; ENGLISH WOMAN IS GAME

Miss Wills Extends Self to Limit to Come out Winner in Last Match

SANNES, France, Jan. 30.—(P)—Mrs. R. E. Haylock of Norfolk, England, today gave Helen Wills the hardest struggle she has thus far experienced in her invasion of the Riviera, carrying their first set to deuce and forcing the American champion to work hard to win at 9-7, 6-2.

Mrs. Haylock played an aggressive game, leading 5 to 4 in the first set, she reached 30 love in the tenth game, or within two points of winning the set, before Miss Wills rallied.

Asked for the reason of her poor showing, she remarked: "An off day, that's all."

The American champion, however, has yet to be extended to a third set within her present invasion. Her victory over Mrs. Haylock takes her into the semi-finals of the Gallia tournament.



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
