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Banana War in Portland Aids Poor Consumer

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1.—(P)—Big ripe bananas at 25 and 30 cents a dozen to the consumer is the result of a banana war being waged here.

Heretofore bananas have sold around 60 cents a dozen. The war is being waged by retail dealers on the market on one side and the regular commission houses on the other.

The market dealers have arranged to bring in their own supplies of bananas. One car arrived last week and another car arrived yesterday. Contracts have been made for a car a week. Cash stores are also negotiating for their own banana supplies.

Prices on bananas will be lower at the principal cities of the state as a result of the Portland situation. It was predicted here today.
