



Stage All Set For Big Boxing Card Tomorrow Night; Main Go Promises To Be Real Thriller

Benny Dotson Will Try For Knockout Against Veteran Joe Gorman—Remainder of Card Indicates Plenty of Action For Cash Customers

All of the boys have completed their training and the stage is all set for the big boxing carnival at Scandia hall tomorrow night when Joe Gorman and Benny Dotson tangle in the 10-round main event. Although he was a few days late in arriving, Gorman has showed the hometown ringworms that he has lost none of his old speed and cunning and that he will be a dangerous opponent for the younger Dotson at all stages of the scrap.

In Portland a couple of years ago these featherweights battled to a draw in a main event at the armory, and Dotson has been wanting to get another crack at the ex-coast featherweight champion ever since then. He wants to add a knockout victory over Gorman to his record before he leaves for other and more profitable fields.

Doyle Some Boy
Bobby Ross and Frankie Doyle are going to exhibit a varied assortment of lefts and rights when they come together in the six round semi-windup. Doyle has victories over some of the sweetest welters on the coast, while Ross is depending largely upon his experience and general ringcraft to score a victory over the blond haired Swede with the Irish monicker. Ross is dangerous at all times, and Doyle, according to newspaper reports, carries a hefty wallop in either hand. On paper it looks like it ought to be a fast fight with a knockout probable at any stage of the proceedings.

Those fans who like to see a slug-

ging match are due to get just what they want when "Logger Joe" of Kirkford and Jim O'Dowd of Klamath Falls square away in the four round special event.

His Like Mule
O'Dowd hits like a mule and is always dangerous, while the mysterious logger shows enough in training to make the fans wonder if O'Dowd can weather the storm. This ought to be a regular scrap.

Bobby Lowe and Chick Kennedy are billed to go four rounds or less in the curtain raiser.

Red Heads Rival, George Wilson, Sustains Hurt Leg in Seattle Game

SEATTLE, Feb. 1. (P)—Having supported his professional football success here yesterday, Harold "Red" Grange, amateur and professional gridiron king, was leaving Seattle today.

Grange yesterday led his Chicago Bears to a 34 to 0 win over a team of Pacific Northwest football players, captained by George Wilson, former University of Washington half-back and an all-American choice.

Wilson, who played against Grange four times on the Pacific coast, injured his right leg in the last contest.

"Red" is expected to arrive in Chicago Thursday with his troupe of eastern stars. He is to go direct from Chicago to his home in Wheaton, Ill., for a three weeks vacation before returning to Los Angeles to fill a motion picture contract.

LENGLEN, WILLS MATCH IN DOUBT

Miss Wills Withdraws from Nice Tournament Because of Dead Tennis Ball

CANNES, Feb. 1. (P)—When Helen Wills is to meet Suzanne Lenglen in a battle across the nets for tennis supremacy, cannot be forecast. Certainly it will not be during the present week and possibly not next week.

Miss Wills has definitely withdrawn from the singles in the Nice

tournament commencing today and in which Suzanne was a belated entrant.

Miss Wills withdrew because a comparatively dead English ball will be in the play, while she requires a ball with a "hop" to it to show her speed. She says she may not play in the Carleton tournament singles next week if the English ball is used.

Suzanne Too Late
There was considerable comment Saturday when Miss Lenglen announced that she would play in the Nice singles. Reference was made to the fact that Suzanne did not announce her decision until after it had become known that Miss Wills had decided to draw out of the Nice tournament. This nettled the French flash and she announced that she would scratch. Then she changed her mind.

Miss Lenglen also will play in the women's doubles and mixed doubles. Miss Wills is similarly entered in these events and it is planned that she and Miss Lenglen will face each other in them.

Yesterday, Miss Wills met with her first defeat on the Riviera, when, paired with Jack Hilliard, she was defeated in the semi-final of the mixed doubles of the Gallia tournament by Miss Emily Petchel of Southampton, England, and Alister McCormick of Chicago.

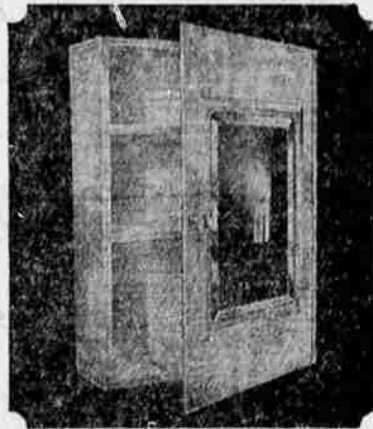
