

Byllesby Man Named Head Of Power Company

Official Personnel Left
Practically Undis-
turbed

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2 (AP)—Consolidation of the California Oregon Power company with the California Power corporation, controlled by R. M. Byllesby and company, Chicago, which became effective yesterday, was followed by the announcement last night that there will be no change in the corporate structure of the California Oregon company.

The official personnel will remain the same except that John D. McKee and J. D. Grant have resigned as president and chairman of the board respectively. They will continue as directors. J. J. O'Brien, president of the Byllesby company has been named president of the merged companies.

SERUM FOUND TO HALT DEATHS OF KLAMATH CATTLE

Disease at Fort Klamath has
Been Taking \$25,000
Yearly Toll

HAS RARE AFFLICTION

Found only in Nevada, Lake
County and in Fort
Klamath Areas

Successful curtailment of a disease which has exacted a yearly toll of approximately \$25,000 from cattlemen in the Fort Klamath district has been accomplished, was announced here today by C. A. Henderson, county agent.

The disease, an affliction of the kidneys, has been prevalent in the Fort Klamath section for years. Last year it was reported in Lake county, where it killed 35 head of cattle. It has also been prevalent in Nevada for years.

Fatal to cattle within two or three days after the first symptoms were noticed, the disease has been a source of worry to Fort Klamath stockmen for a number of years.

Investigation by County Agent C. A. Henderson led to Dr. B. T. Simms, professor of veterinary medicine at O. A. C.

Professor Simms advised that the disease was prevalent in Nevada and last fall secured a serum from the Nevada experimental station.

Fifty Complete Cures

A total of 125 doses were secured by Klamath county. A questionnaire recently sent out brought returns on 68 doses. It was found that 50 doses resulted in complete cures.

The serum failed only when administered too late, when the temperature of the afflicted animal had begun to drop. It was found. All animals treated at the outset of the disease, while the temperature was still rising, were cured without exception.

Dr. Simms is now conferring with the Cutter Laboratories in Oakland, California, and it is expected that they will develop this serum in commercial quantities.

If the company will not undertake manufacture of the serum, it will be made at O. A. C. Simms has announced.

Working on Vaccine

Work is now being done on a vaccine and its success will mean an even greater degree of security than is provided by the serum. It is pointed out.

The disease is most prevalent in the late spring, early summer and fall.

A special request was issued today by County Agent Henderson, that all ranchers whose cattle died under circumstances suggesting the disease, get in touch with him immediately.

Another announcement will be made later regarding success in obtaining the serum in sufficient quantities to give protection to Fort Klamath herds this summer.

MINISTER OWNS ANCIENT BIBLE

CENTRALIA, Wash.—A Bible, printed in Germany in 1521, is owned by the Rev. J. M. Canse, pastor of the First Methodist church here.

The text is entirely in Latin and on the title page is the inscription "L. Coeli Lactantii." Beneath it is a list of chapters. At the end of the volume is a notation, "Basileae, Apud Andreon Cratandrum, Mense Februario, Anno MDXXI."

The volume, still in good state of preservation, was in a consignment of books brought from two old Catholic monasteries in Europe and was purchased by Rev. Mr. Canse in Fort Wayne, Ind., twenty years ago.

Ordered to John Hop-
kins for Long Rest

BALTIMORE, Feb. 2. — (AP) — Cornelius Vanderbilt Jr., newspaper owner, and son of the New York family of that name, who has been in Baltimore for observation by John Hopkins hospital specialists, will enter the institution later this month for a rest cure of two months. Mr. Vanderbilt will leave here tomorrow, it was said, for his home at Beverly Hills, Calif., returning to Baltimore February 20, after arranging for the management of his newspapers while he is at Hopkins.

Mr. Vanderbilt is on the verge of a nervous breakdown, physicians at the hospital said, due to overwork.

Negro Convicted in Trial Lasting Sixteen Minutes

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 2. (AP)—Ed Harris, negro, pleaded guilty here today to an attack on Mrs. Clarence Bryant, whose husband and two children he had confessed to murdering and was sentenced to be hanged Friday, March 5, in the Fayette county jail yard. The trial lasted exactly 16 minutes.

It was one of the speediest trials in the history of the country. Court was called promptly at 9 o'clock. Prosecuting Attorney Maury Kemper elected to try the defendant on the charge growing out of his attack on Mrs. Bryant here January 19. Conviction in this case carried the penalty of hanging. Charges against the negro for the murder of Mr. Bryant and the children were not called.

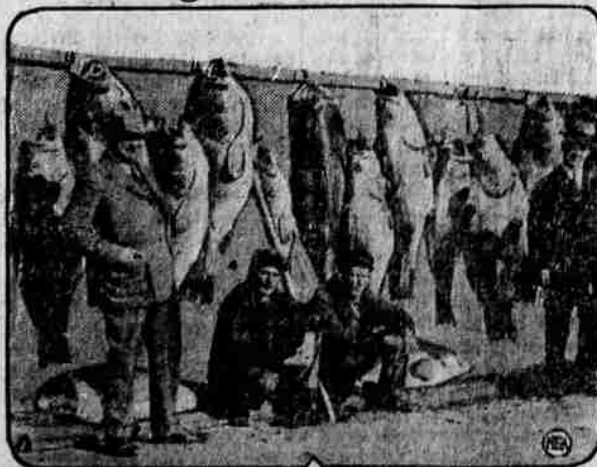

"What?" you say. "Why I remember the time when you could buy a good suit as cheap as ten dollars!" Yes, but back in the days when a dollar would buy a real dollar's worth, it took an exceptionally strong and clever man to earn more than ten of them per week.
