Key Note Mine At Yreka Sold To Syndicate

Development Work to
Begin at Once

(Special to The Herald)
YREKA, Calif., Feb. 3.—While the purchase price was not made public, the sale of the Key Note gold mine in Fool's Paradise on the Anderson grade, seven miles north of Yreka on the Shasta river, Saturday, is said by mining operators in Siskiyou to have been the most important transaction in this vicinity in recent years. The reported sale price runs into thousands of dollars. Charles G. Peterson of Oakland, who is associated with C. E. and E. L. Weston, mining operators of Oakland and San Francisco, purchased the property from F. C. DeChaine and H. M. Howe, who own the mine. An option on the property last fall. It was announced that the new owners will start development work at once and a large crew of men will be employed in putting the mine in condition to operate. Fool's Paradise was once a scene of much gold mining but lack of facilities and money for development work held back the chase for gold in the vicinity when gold was to be taken from nearby properties with less work and expense. The free gold gradually was cleared up and now attention has returned to the Key Note mine region, where DeChaine and Howe own other mining properties that are being viewed by outside buyers.

Roseburg Suffers in Storm Sweep

ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 3. (AP)—Roseburg was thrown into darkness last night when the power line was put out of commission by falling trees. The emergency plant at Winchester was put into use and supplied current for necessary purposes, but street lights in residential districts could not be supplied. The entire county was struck by one of the heaviest winds in recent years, late yesterday afternoon, and reports are coming today of the damage that was done. The telephone lines in many rural districts were put out by falling trees. Sheds were unroofed, billboards leveled, windows broken, and in one case a portion of the roof of a city residence was blown off.

Spies on Trial for Russian Plotting

LENINGRAD, Russia, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Forty eight alleged Estonian spies, including a former consul at Narva were placed on trial today in the provincial court here, accused of plotting against the Soviet state and planning to blow up Russian aviation plants, bridges, airdomes and other structures. Six former czarist officers, a priest, four women and several merchants also went on trial on the same charges. It is believed that at least 30 face the death penalty. The Soviet alleges that several of them have been in close contact with the British insurgent service.

Kaiser's Family Holding Festival

DOORN, Holland, Feb. 3.—(AP)—The festivities at Doorn have centered upon the celebration of the ex-kaiser's sixty-seventh birthday and the arrival yesterday of his son, former crown prince Frederick William.

Last evening there was a grand reception, presided over by the ex-kaiser and his wife, Princess Hermine. They entertained numerous guests, including members of the German and Dutch nobility. Tea was served by Hermine, who wore a striking pink and black silk gown with a diamond tiara. All were very gay.

Wealthy Dog in Suicide Attempt

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—Laddie, Collier aristocrat, once heir with three other dogs to \$16,000, is dead—committing suicide, his keeper believes. His body was found hanging by his tether from the rear porch of Mrs. Marrie Hashaw's home.

Three years ago Laddie was owned by Mrs. Margaret Howard, who on her death provided that \$16,000 of her \$50,000 estate should be devoted to the support of Laddie, Minerva and their two puppies.

After a long court fight, Miss Thelma Leighton, heir at large, succeeded in breaking the will. The case later attracted attention when legal tales representing the dogs brought action, asserting that they were not being supported in the luxury intended for them by their owner.

ate garages were also toppled by the wind.

The Green-Kilborn Clothing store was the worst suffered in the fire. Hat. Damage will run high from the blaze which swept through the building.

Reports today revealed that a number of window panes in the residential section were shattered when the full fury of the wind first came. A brick chimney on the edge of a building in the main business district was toppled by the wind and crashing brick and mortar struck the bumper of a car parked at the curb. No one was injured however. Later in the evening another chimney in the business district fell and a fire was started.

Within 35 minutes times, local firemen responded to 11 alarms, and before the night was past there was approximately 20 calls. The

fires were well scattered throughout the city.

Drivers coming in from the country reported that great limbs were falling from the trees while within the city limits the branches were also falling. One big tree fell across a street, but did no other damage than to tie up traffic on that street.

Many radio aerials were wrecked during the night.
