NO NEW CASES OF SMALL POX ARE REPORTED

Light Epidemic at Pine Grove Apparently Under Control at Present Time

No new cases of small-pox in the Pine Grove district, have been reported to the Klamath county health unit office, according to Dr. G. S. Newson, medical director of the Klamath county health unit.

Apparently the light epidemic in that neighborhood has come to a close, he said this morning. At least no more new cases have been reported into this office.

The health unit was forced to vaccinate 16 pupils of Pine Grove and Olene schools early this week as a result of prevalence of small pox in the neighborhood. Small pox has been the prevailing disease in the state for the past week, according to word received here by the state health department. There were 116 cases reported during the week.
