APPROPRIATION BILL FOR ARMY GOES TO HOUSE

Expenditure of More than Three Hundred Million Dollars is Sought

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The war department appropriation bill, calling for an army of 118,583 enlisted men and 11,749 officers, or approximately the existing strength, has been reported to the house.

It recommends expenditures during the next fiscal year totaling \$339,581,000 or \$1,087,000 above budget estimates.

This represents an increase of \$6,965,000 over last year's appropriation and marks the first instance during the present congress where budget estimates have been exceeded.

Of the total amount military activities would be given \$261,081,000 or an increase of \$1,223,000 above current funds and \$864,000 above budget figures. Non-military activities would receive \$78,500,000, an increase of \$5,741,000 over current funds and \$223,000 above the budget.

Funds directly provided for the army would be expended as follows: For the air service \$15,256,000, an increase of \$345,000 over current figures. An authorization to contract for \$3,000,000 additional expenditures would be provided. Of the total \$7,604,000 or an increase of \$704,000 would be for new equipment.

The bill would provide for a reduction in the number of non-commissioned officers and first class privates to save \$586,000.

The appropriations sub-committee said this reduction would be brought about by failure to fill such vacancies when they occurred.

A total of \$6,000,000 would be for the procurements of ammunition and other supplies to build up the reserve kept on hand.

Provision would be made in funds allotted to the sea coast defenses for continuation of work on the 16 inch battery in the Panama canal defense. Appropriations for the national guard, the organized reserves, and the reserve officers training corps, would contemplate continuation of practically the existing strength of these organizations.

Of funds allotted to the non-military activities, \$80,000,000 would be for river and harbor work. The committee report said this is the amount recommended by the president, including a supplemental estimate of \$10,000,000 recently submitted. It is an increase of \$10,000,000 over current funds.

KITCHEN STARTS FORD'S REVIVAL OF DANCE MUSIC

DETROIT.—The renaissance in dance music which Henry Ford is sponsoring through the revival of old-time tunes and with the aid of many old-time fiddlers, had its inception in the kitchen of a modest home outside of Big Rapids, Mich.

It was here that Henry Ford, on Edison, Harvey S. Firestone and a few other intimate friends, first a vacation trip north with Thomas say "Jep" Bisbee, maker of violins and fiddler at old-time country dances.

"Jep"—or "Jasper" Bisbee, of Paris, Mich., as he registered at Detroit's leading hotel as the guest of Mr. Ford—is 83 years old.

Father of Movement
"He is the father of the movement back to the old-fashioned dances," Mr. Ford said. "It was listening to him and his old-fashioned tunes that helped to crystallize my belief that the time had come for a revival of the old dances. A very fine old man in Jasper and he knows his business."

Ford first heard him in 1922, and shortly after "Jep" came to Detroit to make the first contribution to Mr. Ford's Americana of dance music. Later, Mr. Ford sent him east to Mr. Edison's laboratory where some of the aged fiddler's choicest selections were perpetuated in the phonograph reproduction rooms.

Volstead Law Not Enforceable, View

PITTSBURGH, Pa. Feb. 6. (AP)—The Right Rev. Alexander Mann, bishop of the Pittsburgh diocese of the Protestant Episcopal church believes that prohibition cannot be enforced and favors modification of the Volstead act to permit light wines and pure beer.

Bishop Mann gave his view on the prohibition question today commenting on the advocacy of beer and light wines by the church temperance society of the church.

"Personally I'd not believe in the 18 amendment," he said. "and I

think the Volstead act is a poor law. Prohibition cannot possibly be enforced. The law is resented by many persons, good and bad.

"The fact that every bootlegger would vote for continuance of the Volstead law is proof that it is not a good law. Understand plainly, I do not believe in breaking any law. I believe in keeping the law, once it is passed, but I do believe that bad laws should be modified. But as long as the law remains in force it should be kept. I think it should be modified and light wines and pure beer permitted for public consumption."

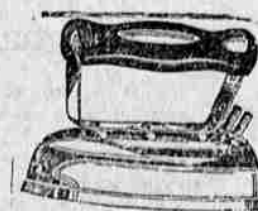
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Plane Passengers Can't Stay Awake
