COAST GUARDS TO FACE NAVY COURT

SEATTLE, Feb. 8. (AP)—Preparations were going forward here today for the trial before a court martial of Lieutenant Commander William P. Wishar and Lieutenant Carlton W. Smith, coast guard officers.

The principal charge against the two men is said to involve alleged manipulation of bids for repairs to the cutter Algonquin, while Wishar and Smith were officers of the boat. A Portland firm is said to have been awarded the contract although a Seattle firm made a lower bid.

Other charges against Wishar are said to be that he failed to require drill of his crew and that he incorrectly reported the location of the capture of a rum boat.

Captain F. S. Vanhooker, district coast guard judge advocate, will act as prosecuting officer and Captain C. S. Cochran of San Francisco will preside. Wishar will be defended by Attorney J. J. Sullivan.

OREGON FLOODS DESTROY ROADS, ISOLATE HOMES

Summary of Conditions Shows Big Loss Sustained; Highways Closed

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8. (AP)—Continued rains through western and parts of eastern Oregon today resulted in flood conditions and damage to highways inundated by rising waters.

A summary of conditions as revealed in reports to the Oregonian follows:

Southeast Portland flooded by Johnson creek with many homes isolated.

A slide near Knight blocked the Tillamook rail line. Eugene basements flooded as result of two-inch fall of rain. Willamette river reported rising.

The Dalles reported Columbia highway partially blocked by slides between Milser and Crown Point and south of The Dalles.

Water 18 inches over pavement on Silverton-Salem highway.

Harsburg reported street intersections flooded.

Ninety mile gale hits White Salmon, Wash., breaking windows, blowing down chimneys and damaging timber in the Burdett mountain district.

Southeasterly gale predicted for Newport.

Cascade Locks reported wires down and highway traffic delayed by storm.

Pendleton reported good rain, with heavy snow in Blue mountains.

Campus awash at Oregon Agricultural college.

Damage to splash dams in Middle fork of Coquille river estimated at \$15,000.

HOLD AMERICANS FOR ROBBERY OF MEXICAN GRAVE

Blamed for Taking Head of Notorious Bandit Chief—Affair Mystery

PARRAL, Mexico, Feb. 8. (AP)—The headless body of Francisco Villa, notorious bandit-chief, was found open by about Friday night, may be the silent accuser of Emil Halmdahl, American soldier of fortune and a Mexican, Alberto Corral, said to be of Los Angeles.

Halmdahl, reputed to have been a guide for Pershing's fruitless expedition after Villa, and Corral are in jail here, while authorities are trying to learn what was done with Villa's head, which the grave robbers cut off and took.

No satisfactory explanation has been given for the decapitation, although a note left with the body said the head was to be sent to Columbus, New Mexico, scene of the bandit raid in 1916 that resulted in the American punitive expedition.

Many here, believe the killer's head was fished from the tomb for a surreptitious sale to some institution for scientific study.

Little is known as yet of the arrest of Halmdahl and Corral. They are said to have maintained they were in this section on a hunting trip.

Conditions about the grave offered small aid to solution of the mystery, except that it must have taken a number of strong men to dislodge the weighty concrete covering slab. Liquor bottles and other smelly of pungent chemicals, found near the grave are unaccounted for. The body was left partly exposed to view, apparently having been moved only enough for the decapitators to do their work.

Villa was buried here in 1923 following his death at the hands of some of his disgruntled henchmen.

RIVER SHANNON FLOWS, BUT NOT IN RIGHT PLACE
