MAY PICK CHASE AS NEW HEAD OF EUGENE SCHOOL

Carolina Educator Regarded as Likely Leader at Oregon University

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8. — (AP) — Dr. Harry Woodburn Chase, president of the University of North Carolina, who was here today enroute to Eugene, where he will meet the board of regents of the University of Oregon tomorrow, said his first impressions of Oregon were very favorable. He came west to look over the situation in this state to be able to reply to the board of regents if an invitation is extended to him.

In an interview this morning, he discussed liberalism in education and expressed clearly his belief that a university should be unfettered in the teaching of science.

"While I am most heartily in favor of the new school of liberalism, the type of individual one is, should not determine just what method of education should be applied," he explained.

"I certainly favor a liberal education for the mind that is able to receive it."

While the southern states have been flooded with proposed laws denouncing modernism in the teaching of certain sciences, Dr. Chase thinks this matter will straighten itself out in time.

"The Scopes affair has hurt us some," he said. "But while I think the people who opposed the new teachings are sincere and are devoted to what they think is in the interests of human welfare, they are simply not informed. Their trial at Dayton, Tenn., was not a fair trial at all—it was simply a show."
