WILL OPEN TULE LAKE LAND BIDS ON FEBRUARY 24

362 Lots Containing 56,758 Acres Open; Produced Large Crop in 1925

Bids on 362 lots containing some 56,758 acres of government lands in Tule lake will be opened on February 24, according to announcement issued by officials of the reclamation service here.

There is no limit to the number of lots that may be awarded to any one person and, due to the success of Tule lake crops last year, there is expected to be a spirited bidding for the choice parcels.

Yields during 1925 on these lands totaled 515,000 bushels of various grains, and a quantity of hay and grain not tabulated.

All land must be cultivated, which in the opinion of the superintendent, is more adapted to cultivation than to grazing. Livestock will not be permitted to run at large on any of the land leased between April 1 and October 15, without written permission of the superintendent. Bids of less than \$40 a lot will not be considered. Maps may be had for 25c each, or inspected at the post offices in the county.

Indiana Had Speed Law Long Time Ago

VINCENNES, Ind., Feb. 10.—(AP)—The first speed law in Indiana was enacted 111 years ago by the borough of Vincennes, patriarch of Indiana cities, and it said:

"If any person or persons shall gallop any horse, mare or gelding in any street within the borough, every person so offending shall on conviction forfeit and pay the sum of \$5 with costs."

Until 25 years ago there were frequent convictions under the ordinance. Today the horse is forgotten in the press of automobile regulation.

CARDINALS PUT UP GREAT FIGHT BUT LOSE GAME

Local Independent Team is Beaten 52 to 37, by Ashland Basketball Team

Klamath Falls Cardinals were beaten last night, but they played their best game of the season.

Doped to be licked by at least 30 points, if not 40, the Cardinals slayed like Trojans, and held the experienced Ashland National guard team to 52 to 37, at the legion gym.

The Cardinals started like a whirlwind, Swanson and Beckley, forwards, crashed through the Ashland team twice, netted baskets and then tossed a free throw.

The score saw-sawed back and forth throughout the first quarter and up to the first half of the second quarter, when the score was tied, 13 to 13. Then the offense of the Ashland team swung into working order and by the end the half,

a few minutes later the score was 30 to 18 in favor of Ashland.

The remainder of the game, was a desperate effort of Klamath to come back, and the smooth team play of the Ashland team which repelled Klamath's efforts.

Beckley and Swanson again starred for the Cardinals but were ably supported by Robertson, center and Carter and Heckman guards. Bryant, center, was the outstanding player for Ashland.
