WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(P)—President Coolidge was told today by Senators McNary and Stanfield, republicans, Oregon, that they believed it would be impossible to obtain senate confirmation of the nomination of Wallace McCamant of Portland to be a circuit judge.

A poll of the senate judiciary committee which has the nomination under consideration, they said, indicated an adverse report would be given to the senate and in such an event they saw no possibility of favorable senate action.

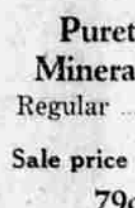

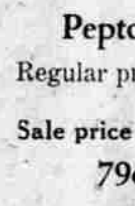
