

RELIGION SEEN AS BIG FACTOR IN LIFE TODAY

University of California Professor Principal Talker at Eugene Meet

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 12. (AP) — "Life is richer than mere scholarship. The youth of today has enormous possibilities. One of the great needs of the day is the influence of inspired lives in the lives of the young. There are supreme possibilities for the youths of today if they will learn to live their lives sagaciously."

This was the message of Dr. Charles E. Rugh of the University of California, who was the principal speaker at the religious conference held at the University of Oregon yesterday afternoon and evening. W. S. Gilbert of Portland was to have spoken, but was unable to be present.

The viewpoint of students, faculty members and religious leaders was given in short talks. Father E. V. O'Hara of the St. Mary's Roman Catholic church of Eugene and Rev. J. Franklin Haas of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Eugene spoke from the ministerial viewpoint. Dean E. C. Robbins, Professor C. E. Carpenter and Dr. A. E. Caswell gave the point of view of the faculty members, while the students were represented by Walter Malcolm, president of the student body, Genevieve Chase and Robert Hunt.

AGGIE HOOPSTERS BRING WORRY TO U. OF O. PLAYERS

Saturday Night Game causes Anxiety at Eugene as 1925 Game Recalled

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 12. (AP) — University of Oregon basketball players, who twice defeated Washington, Washington state, Idaho and Montana, are worried. Interviews with the players last night revealed the fact.

The cause of worry is Oregon Agricultural College, whose basketball team is to be faced by the Lemon-yellow squad at Corvallis Saturday night.

The Aggies, it will be remembered, took the championship away from Oregon last year in the northern division of the coast conference when they won from the Webfoots in the third and deciding game of a three-game play-off series for the title. This year, too, the Aggies have come through the season thus far without a defeat, and the two Oregon institutions will have to fight it out anew for the northern division honors.

The two schools use entirely different systems in their play. O. A. C. plays a slow, waiting game, employing the passage system. Oregon has the individual player system in guarding, each man taking a man staying with him for a five-man defense. When on the offensive Oregon's team is another unit, in working the ball down for a close shot if possible.

Oregon's game is speedy, while O. A. C. uses a system of modified "stalling," waiting for an opportunity instead of attempting to create one. Statistics to date reveal that Roy Okerburg, high scorer of the entire conference last season, is again leading the northern division this season with 30 field goals and 15 foul shots for a total of 75 points. Gunther, Oregon forward, playing his first conference season, is second on the list with 33 field goals, and five fouls for 71 points. "Swede" Westergren, last year's all-coast guard, is third with 27 field goals and 12 fouls, for 66 points. From there the list slumps to 46

points, garnered by Hilman of Montana. Miles of Idaho and Burr of O. A. C. are tied for fifth place with 38 points apiece.

Westergren, who is regarded as one of the speediest and most dependable guards in the conference, has been up to his usual form in holding down his opponents' score, and has been, as the statistics reveal, one of the greatest scoring aces for his own team.

Oakland Plants in Big Expansion Move

The force of 3,000 employees now engaged in production and administrative work at the Oakland Motor Car company to produce the Oakland and Pontiac Sixes is gradually being augmented. A. J. Brandt, vice president in charge of operations states that within the next two months this force will be increased by approximately 600, bringing the number of employees up to the highest peak in the history of the company—equalled only in the boom year of 1919.

That this number of employees can build the number of cars of both lines scheduled for this year illustrates, according to Mr. Brandt, the great strides that have been made in production efficiency.

"Manufacturing equipment is being improved so rapidly that it has the practical effect of increasing the potential capacity of every motor car plant by a significant percentage each year," he states. "Every time a factory set-up is laid out for a new model, it is found that considerably less space is required for the same sequence of operations than for cars built in former years."

"The removal of all body-building activities to the Fisher Body corporation plant within a few blocks from the factory has given much space in the Oakland plants. Conveyor systems, more efficient arrangement of production machinery and more effective use of manpower has enabled us to turn out more automobiles in a given space than ever before."
