

KLAMATH COUNTY POLITICS QUIET ON THE SURFACE

Candidates Shy About Announcing Themselves; Bunnell May Run

An ominous hush prevails in Klamath politics. It is the heavy quiet that precedes a storm.

That storm will break when present incumbents stir from their lethargy and announce point blank whether or not they will be candidates for reelection at the May primaries. But until they do the political perspective will present a quiet and peaceful outlook.

Will Judge Bunnell come out for reelection or will he voluntarily retire to his farm? This is one question puzzling the prognosticators.

The county judge was approached on the subject the other day. He refused to commit himself in any respect, but by saying nothing he said much. That is, had he decided to remain out of the race, he would have said so emphatically. But by saying nothing he indicated the contrary.

Decision March 1

"I'll make my decision some time around the first of March," he explained. "I'm wondering what the rest of these fellows, who are thinking of coming out, are planning to do. Why don't they say something?"

Apparently the county judge wants his old job back again, but there are thousands that would like to see a change and from this anti-Bunnell army is expected to come a candidate that will give the judge a stiff run for the primed position.

Names, a half a score of them, have been suggested. There has been Gene Hammond, well known Merrill farmer, whose name has been brought up time and again. But Hammond, it is learned, will not run.

George Offield, also of Merrill, is receptive to the job of county judge. If somebody would gather about the flag and give him some support. So far, that support has been conspicuous by its absence.

Maddox Strong

J. A. Maddox, contractor, has also been mentioned. He would, it is conceded, make a strong race for the position, because of his unwavering honesty and good judgment.

Bill Lee, of course, is also in the race, if anybody will come forth and give him a boost. But nobody has, and the talk about the political curb-stones now is that Bill has buried his hopes.

The commissioner battle will not be of particular moment. Charles Martin will not run for the job, it is becoming apparent. He has had enough experience on the county court. Who will run remains a puzzle.

Interesting Race

The district attorney's race will be interesting. District Attorney Elliott announced recently that he would not run for district attorney at the May primaries. But there is a persistent rumor current that the prosecutor may see fit to change his mind at the psychological moment.

In fact Elliott intimated as much recently. He had been told of a re-

call petition, which was being talked up against him by certain vocalists.

"Well," he remarked, "if they keep up like that, I will have to get back in the race."

W. A. Wiest, his assistant, and one of the ablest criminal prosecutors in the county, is to use the vernacular, "sitting tight." He has announced his candidacy for the job and then without further political gab-festings has returned to his work.

Don't Want Mud

But Wiest says that if the fight for the job is going to be as muddy as one as the last, in which he participated, he would have none of it.

Even though Elliott comes out for election, Wiest feels he will not be hitting the hand of his chief, for Elliott assured him time and again he would not run, and in addition made a public statement to that effect.

Asburst is biding his time, following his announcement of candidacy. He is working quietly and gathering a good support.

Orem May Not Run

The assessor race is dormant, except perhaps that Roy Orem, is not likely to be a candidate at the primaries. Orem would have probably made a hard race for the job, with more than an even chance for success. Orem has been a resident of this city for years, and is one of the most aggressive young business men in the county. He is now engaged in liquidation of assets of the First States Saving Bank, defunct.

Naturally, when Assessor Bill Lee finds that his chances for the county judge throne, are nil, he will run for reelection. And while the chances are that he may survive the May primaries, it is generally predicted that his political grave will be dug for him at the November election.

W. W. McNealy, who is constantly mentioned as a candidate for county assessor, has a very large following in the city, but he is not known so well in agricultural districts. Whether or not he can pull the support from that section of the county is the question.

When incumbents stir from their lethargy and announce point blank whether or not they will run for reelection, the fight will be on. Until that time, political fans, must content themselves with the contradictory buzz of rumors.
