Starkey Will Arrive Here Six Days Before Presentation of Card; Dotson to Have Tough Pickings, View

Public workouts will be held at Scandia hall beginning tomorrow at 2:30 and at 6:30, according to word today from the boxing commission. Opinion concerning the headline bout, between Kid Starkey and Ben Dotson, still continues to be warmly divided, with two groups each contending the other is all wrong. That Dotson has speed and can hit is admitted, but Starkey's backers point out that the Chico boy can give as well as take, and insist that his ruggedness and experience will more than offset the flashy Dotson attack. This is the first bout held here in a long time to be handled entirely by the boxing commission, and in view of the fighters already signed up, it appears that the board is on its mettle and determined to produce a showing that will more than offset the bad taste left here from the Dotson-Gorman go. 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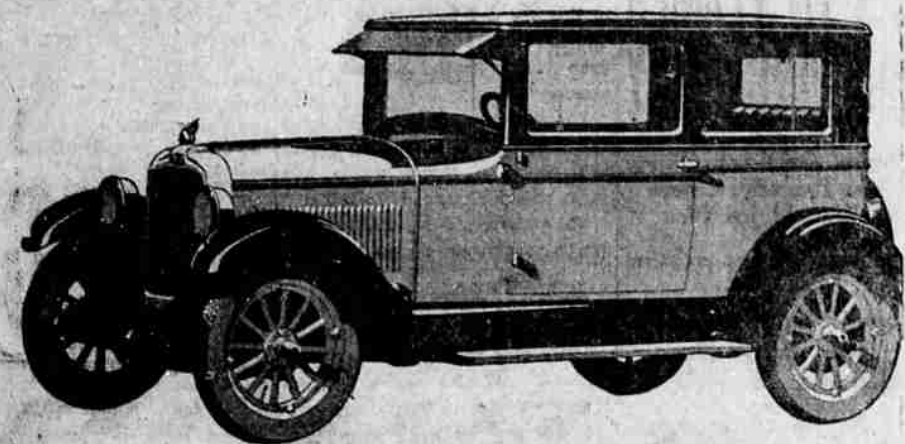
