YREKA, Calif., Feb. 26.—Yards of woe will confront the diligent voters of Siskiyou, as well as all other counties in California, when they march their march to the primary polls, August 31, and again November 2, at the general elections.

The first election in Yreka will be the municipal contest for two trustees and a city clerk and it has been set for April 13. 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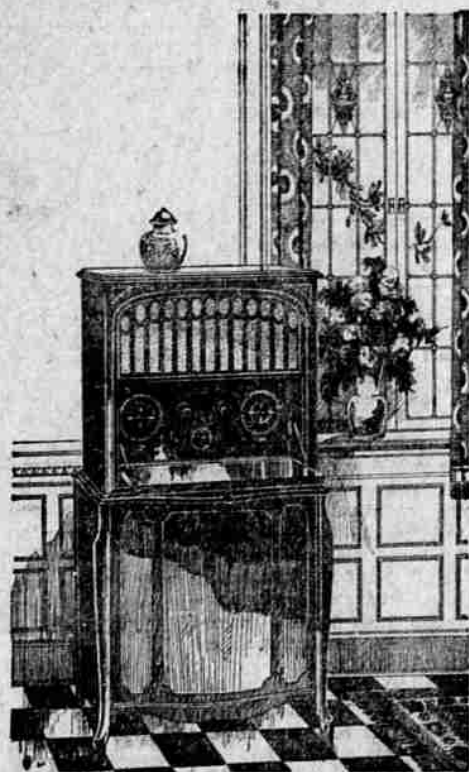


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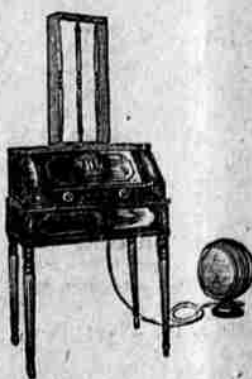
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
