At The Pine Tree

The picture which broke all long run records is coming to the Pine Tree theatre next Tuesday when "The Tea Commandments" opens a two days engagement there at popular prices. Playing the "two-a-day" in New York City, it broke the record of 59 weeks which had been held by "The Covered Wagon," remaining at capacity business for 62 consecutive weeks. "The Birth of a Nation" was only able to last 44 weeks on Broadway, while "Way Down East," "The Four Horsemen," and "The Thief of Bagdad" held up for a lesser period. About five million people have seen this remarkable picture since it was first shown at a two dollar scale.

In Los Angeles it held up for 31 weeks, Chicago and Philadelphia 20, Boston 14, San Francisco and Cleveland 8; while in Detroit, Washington and Cincinnati it stayed 5 weeks. Sidney, Australia, played host to it for 30 weeks as did Melbourne, while Paris and Auckland, New Zealand greeted it enthusiastically for 10 weeks. Berlin, as impoverished as it was at the time, played the picture for 4 weeks, with the best seats selling at five dollars each.

SALE OF TIMBER
KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVATION
MODOC POINT UNIT

Sealed bids in duplicate on forms provided therefor, marked outside "Bid, Modoc Point Unit" and addressed to the "Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon," will be received until 2 o'clock p. m. Pacific time, Wednesday, April 28, 1926, for the purchase of the merchantable timber estimated to be 62,000,000 feet, principally western yellow pine, on a tract within the Klamath Indian Reservation, Oregon, described as Sections 34, 35, and parts of Sections 15, 21, 22, 26, 27, 28, 33 and 36 in T. 35 S. R. 7 E.; Sections 2, 11, 14 and parts of Sections 1, 3, 19, 12, 13 and 15, T. 36 S. R. 7 E.; W. M. This area of approximately 8,000 acres includes about 2,400 acres of allotted land with estimated stand of 17,000,000 feet, mostly yellow pine, for which separate approved contracts must afterwards be made with allottees desiring to sell; and on terms similar to the contract for the unallotted timber. There is also within this unit approximately 1,080 acres of fee-patented land with an estimated stand of 6,000,000 feet of timber which probably can be purchased. Each bid must state the price per thousand feet B. M. Scribner Decimal C Log Scale, that will be paid for timber cut and scaled prior to April 1, 1930. On April 1, 1930, the prices for each species will for the three-year period then beginning, be advanced twelve per cent (12%) over the price bid and accepted for the first period of the contract; and on April 1, 1933, the price will advance twelve per cent (12%) over the price paid during the preceding three-year period. No bid will be considered for less than \$4.50 per thousand feet, B. M., for yellow and sugar pine, \$2.25 for Douglas fir and incense cedar and \$1.00 for all other species cut during the first period. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for \$7,000 on a solvent National Bank, payable to the Special Disbursing Agent, Klamath Agency, Oregon. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders, applied as part of the purchase price of successful bidder against timber actually cut on this unit only, or retained as liquidated damages if the bidder shall not execute contract and furnish satisfactory bond for \$10,000 within 60 days from the acceptance of his bid. The right to waive technical defects, and to reject any and all bids is reserved. 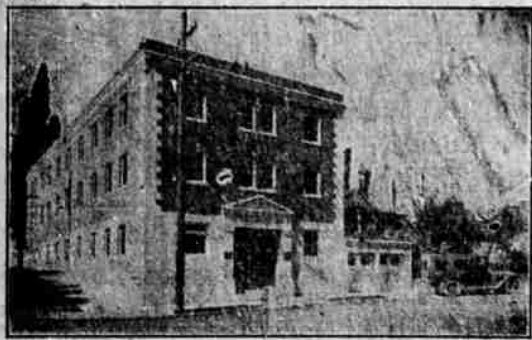
