## GERMANY HOLDS UPPER HAND IN LEAGUE BATTLE

### Great Britain and France Powerless, view of Statemen; is Coup

Geneva, March 6. (P)—"For the first time in the history of the League of Nations Great Britain and France can do nothing. All the cards are in the hands of Germany."

This statement was made today by a personage in summing up the turmoil over the reconstruction of the council of the league, which is to come up at the sessions beginning next Monday and which has caused the greatest crisis in the Geneva institution since its birth.

This may be said to portray the present situation in the scramble for permanent seats in the council. It means that Germany, even before entering the league, has won the first skirmish in what is known here as her great peace offensive to be conducted through the instrumentality of the league.

In league circles the opinion prevails that Germany's former enemies committed a tactical error in launching Poland's claim for a permanent seat under conditions which it made appear that there is a pact, calculated to undermine the efforts of the Locarno accords and in violation of the tacit agreement at Locarno that when Germany came into the league council she would come in alone. If the league is to remain truly inland not shrink into a purely European institution it is recognized that Latin-America with 19 members in the organization must have a fair proportion of seats in the council and that if the council is enlarged Latin-America's two seats must be increased.

Only two seats, those held by Spain and Belgium, are really non-permanent seats, open for all candidates, for the league undoubtedly will always allocate one non-permanent seat to the little entente, another to the Nordic-Scandinavian group and two to Latin-America.

#### SALE OF TIMBER KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVATION MODOC POINT UNIT

Sealed bids in duplicate on forms provided therefor, marked outside "Bid, Modoc Point Unit" and addressed to the "Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon," will be received until 2 o'clock p. m., Pacific time, Wednesday, April 28, 1926, for the purchase of the merchantable timber estimated to be 62,000,000 feet, principally western yellow pine, on a tract within the Klamath Indian Reservation, Oregon, described as Sections 34, 35, and parts of Sections 15, 21, 22, 26, 27, 28, 33 and 36 in T. 35 S., R. 7 E.; Sections 2, 11, 14 and parts of Sections 1, 3, 10, 12, 13 and 15, T. 36 S., R. 7 E., W. M. This area of approximately 8,000 acres includes about 2,400 acres of allotted land with estimated stand of 17,000,000 feet, mostly yellow pine, for which separate approved contracts must afterwards be made with allottees desiring to sell; and on terms similar to the contract for the unallotted timber. There is also within this unit approximately 1,080 acres of fee-patented land with an estimated stand of 6,000,000 feet of timber which probably can be purchased. Each bid must state the price per thousand feet B. M. Scribner Decimal C Log Scale, that will be paid for timber cut and scaled prior to April 1, 1930. On April 1, 1930, the prices for each species will for the three-year period then beginning, be advanced twelve per cent (12%) over the price bid and accepted for the first period of the contract; and on April 1, 1933, the price will advance twelve per cent (12%) over the price paid during the preceding three-year period. No bid will be considered for less than \$4.50 per thousand feet, B. M., for yellow and sugar pine, \$2.25 for Douglas fir and incense cedar and \$1.00 for all other species cut during the first period. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for \$7,000 on a solvent National Bank, payable to the Special Disbursing Agent, Klamath Agency, Oregon. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders, applied as part of the purchase price of successful bidder against timber actually cut on this unit only, or retained as liquidated damages if the bidder shall not execute contract and furnish satisfactory bond for \$10,000 within 60 days from the acceptance of his bid. ## ASK 250 MILLION TO BE SPENT FOR AGRICULTURE AID

### Creation of Joint Federal Farm Export and Sales Association Sought

WASHINGTON, March 6. (P)—Two hundred and fifty million dollars will be appropriated out of the United States treasury to create a joint federal farm export and cooperative marketing association under a bill introduced today by Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa.

Management of the organization, which would be known as the "Farmers' National Export Cooperative," would be vested in a board of directors of three persons appointed by the secretary of agriculture from nominations of the American farm bureau federation, the farmer's educational and cooperative union, and the national grange.

The organization would be empowered to purchase from the farmers all exportable surplus crops at an average cost of production plus five per cent profit. The department of agriculture would be required to fix the average cost of production on the basis of the five preceding years.

Losses sustained from the sale of the surplus in foreign markets would be apportioned among the farmers "to the end that a trade dividend or excise tax on the total sales of such commodity in the United States as made by the farmers may be levied by law at a sufficient rate to liquidate such a loss."

A farm advisory board would be created from representatives of each of the 13 land bank districts who would serve without salary in an advisory capacity and nominate six members to form the "federal farm operating board."

The operating board would have active charge of handling the export business. Salaries of \$10,000 annually would be paid members of the operating board and the board of directors.

The organization would be authorized to issue interest bearing bonds aggregating not more than five times its paid-in capital and would mature not less than a year and not more than five years after issuance.

"The ultimate aim of the cooperative organization," the bill states, "shall be to supply the needs of the members, to attain the control of the necessary production, to encourage membership, to promote other societies, to create national organizations and to effect a union of the societies of the world in an international organization having the same common purpose."

### Dorris Visitor Has Car Stolen
