WE are all wondering just how much Mrs. John B. Henderson, formerly of Missouri, but now a social luminary in Washington, will accomplish by her campaign against cigarette smoking by women and what she calls their immediate way of dressing. From press reports which I have been following, the comments of members of several feminine clubs and organizations, leads me to believe she won't get so far, that is not as far as she has hopes for.

Yes, it's all very true that some people will commend Mrs. Henderson for her efforts, for there is no doubt that current costumes, aloof and aloft, seem shocking to survivors of the Victorian Age—by the way, not such a bad age. These are defensible views, and that they justify attacks on the newer fashion in women's dress by no means follows, and it is something of a pity that Mrs. Henderson and those who agree with her cannot be content with dressing as they please and allowing those with different ideas to exercise a like privilege.

That there is anything wicked or immodest about a disclosure of what somebody has called "drumsticks and wish bones" or in the smoking of cigarettes, is a problem in the relative, not in the absolute. The assumption that the women who illustrate them are any worse than the women who do not can be made only by the narrow-minded. As for cigarettes it is said they are the least harmful form in which tobacco can be used by either women or men. The case for and against tobacco has been argued endlessly, but what the general conclusion is can be discovered in the same way as the monument of Sir Christopher Wren — by just looking around. If it is true that tobacco really is bad, then sure enough the human race is doomed.

From the standpoint of esthetics, Mrs. Henderson and her supporters can be put instantly out of court, and their case with the bygonists is also lost. Never since the classic days of Greece have the garments of women been either as beautiful or as healthful as they are right now. Artists are unanimous as to that, and the doctors are nearly so. Presumably, the acceptance of short skirts by most women is due to the fact, that like bobbed hair, they take ten years or so from the apparent age.

The critics of the fashions forget that by their denunciation of short skirts they are reviving the sort of interest which existed when the skirts first tied the ground—a sort of interest dead or dying, now that the attraction of the unfamiliar is gone. If they think real hard perhaps they will realize that a full view of a stocking lights no baleful fires, while the accidental glimpse of one used to do that quite often, if all tales we hear are true.

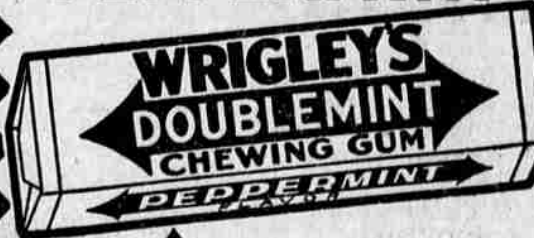
