Coolidge Refuses To Hear Strikers

WASHINGTON, March 17.—(AP)—A delegation of strikers from the Passaic, N. J. textile mills failed today in an attempt to lay their grievances before President Coolidge. The group, headed by Albert Weisbord visited the White House and conferred for nearly half an hour with Secretary Sanders, who refused to permit them to see the president. The secretary advised the delegation to lay their case before the department of labor. Weisbord said they probably would not do that.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—(AP)—Textile mill owners in the New Jersey strike area went into conference today with Secretary Davis and labor department conciliators in an effort to reach an accord on a plan of settlement.

Davis High Bidder on Lakeview Tract

PORTLAND, Ore., March 17.—(AP)—Two bids were received today by the forest service on 37,000,000 feet of yellow, white and lodge pole pine, white fir and other species of timber in the Fremont national forest.

Henry C. Davis was high bidder, offering \$3.93 a thousand for pine and 53 cents for white fir and other species. He will be awarded the contract if the financial statement, required by the government in making timber sales, is satisfactory. The Underwood Lumber company, Lakeview, bid \$3.25 for pine and 50c for other species, the advertised price.

Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Rogers left Tuesday by motor for southern California where they will spend a week or ten days on a pleasure trip.

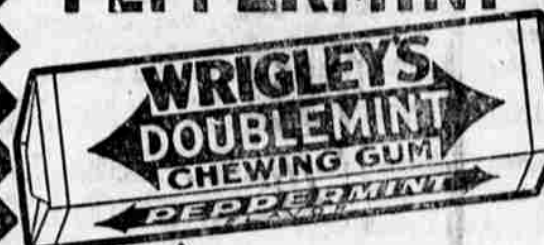

Trout Liberated By Game Officials

PORTLAND, Ore., March 17.—(AP)—About 240,500 rainbow and cutthroat trout between two and two and one-half inches in length were liberated this week in Benton, Linn and Polk county streams, most of which were closed recently by the game commission. The fish were taken from the Roaring River hatchery where the ponds have become crowded. Several hundred thousand fish remain there and will be liberated later. About 200,000 trout of the same size will be set free in Clatsop streams this week.
