

Canadian Gold Rush Gains As Tale Spreads

Hundreds Join in Stampede to Klondike

HUDSON, Ont., March 17. (AP)—The old melodrama of the Klondike gold rush is once more being re-enacted with this little snow-buried hamlet as its latest stage setting.

The reported finding of gold in the Red Lake district in northern Ontario has aroused Hudson from its customary winter hibernation and converted it into a bustling centre of activity, the gathering point for hundreds of adventurous spirits lured here by the hope of plucking a fortune from the earth.

All of the characters and properties of the "Far North" movie thriller are to be seen in real life here today—the dog train, the pack and the packer, the snowshoes, the Ojibway Indians, the bearded prospectors, the dance hall, the hastily constructed stores, the log cabins, shacks, and tents which house the new arrivals.

Hudson is on the northern trans-continental line of the Canadian National Railways some 240 miles east of Winnipeg and 12 miles to the west of Sioux Lookout. It is the nearest railway point to the Red Lake district. Hudson was little more than a name on the railway map a short time ago.

Chewing Gum Magnate Finds Rich Pay Streak On Island Now Used As Tourist Mecca

AVALON, Santa Catalina Island, March 18. (AP)—A time will come, say veteran mining men, when the "toy" mine being developed by William Wrigley, Jr., will surprise the quip-makers who have referred to it as "just another of Wrigley's playthings."

Like the small boy who overhauls a clock, so the owner of this island, some thirty miles off the coast of southern California, is digging the internals out of his domain to learn what it is made of.

Wrigley's mining efforts have gone only to the extent of "scratching" the surface of three deposits in the Mt. Black Jack, the Quarry and the D. M. Renton veins. Some twenty of these veins have been discovered in the development period of two years.

Silvery gleams in a small chunk of rock which he was about to hurl at a troublesome wild goat caught Wrigley's eye one day while he was hiking on Mt. Black Jack. It led to the discovery of the mine which bears the name of the mountain. A 490-foot shaft and laterals today show pay streaks as wide as seven and a half feet running \$40, and narrower veins carrying up to \$347 a ton, evidenced by smelter returns.

The "Quarry," second prospect

worked and originally the source of paving materials for main land roads, yielded a four and a half foot vein of sulphide milling ore carrying silver.

Mother Nature concealed the most promising of the "diggings" some 1500 feet up the perpendicular cliffs overlooking Pebble Beach, where mountain goats barely find footing. On three levels, 200 feet in, veins were found twenty-eight to thirty-six feet across. These are in the Renton, which shows promise of being the richest producer yet discovered, for the veins are widening as work progresses.

A 100-ton flotation mill, utilizing salt water in the concentration process, has been installed at White Landing at the foot of a recently completed four-mile road from Black Jack mine.

The island, one of a chain that until a hundred years ago harbored an Indian civilization, at one time entertained a rush in a small way like the one to California in '49. Mining on a broad scale was prosecuted but no attempt was made to pursue ore bodies to any substantial depth. The next major attempt was undertaken by an English syndicate but this attempt failed. Wrigley purchased the island several years ago.

Gag Ruling Of Court Will Be Fought Against

Enjoe, editor, petitioned the circuit court for an order dissolving the injunction issued Friday against the publication of testimony in the John Doe investigation of editorials in the paper, alleging that effort was being made to strouse religious prejudices in behalf of Rudolph Jessner, who faces trial for the slaying of a policeman, the newspaper also asked the court for a copy of the records of the hearing for the purpose of publishing them.

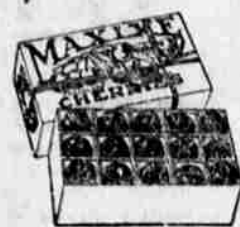

MARKET BRIEFS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 18. (AP)—Liberal arrivals of fresh receipts are forcing a lower trend in the local egg market and values are a half to 1c lower for the day. Fresh standard extras are down to a 24c top with current receipts at 22 cents. Other grades are unchanged.

Although production is increasing there is quite a heavy movement into storage and prices are not expected to work much lower. There are now more than 24,000 cases reported in local coolers.

Butter continues steady and unchanged in the local market. Extras still posted at the 39 cent level with standard cubes 38c and prints 45c to the retail dealer. There were 14,779 pounds of butter received in the local market yesterday and 15,946 pounds manufactured.

Local poultry prices firm and unchanged. Supply still short. Country dressed meats steady; choice light calves 17 1/2 to 18c; choice light hogs 16 1/4 to 19c.
