Woodward Speaks at Rotary Club

Nickel Plate Merger Plans Revived Again

Officers and Directors Resign to Pave Way

NEW YORK, March 19. —(P) —Wall Street was convinced today that the Van Swearingen Brothers of Cleveland are going ahead with new plans for the Nickel Plate railroad merger recently denied approval by the interstate commerce commission.

The resignations yesterday of officers and directors of three of the five roads involved, to eliminate interlocking directorates was interpreted in banking circles as a step by the Van Swearingens to remove official criticism of the proposed merger.

O. P. Van Swearingen resigned last night as director and chairman of the Nickel Plate, but retains the chairmanship of the Chesapeake and Ohio, and the Hocking Valley railroads. His brother, M. J. Van Swearingen, is his successor as chairman of the Nickel Plate and has resigned as a director of the two other roads.

BOLSHEVIK, 14, IS OUSTED FROM ASTORIA OFFICE

President of School Student Body Forced to Quit Leadership Position

ASTORIA, Ore., March 19. —(P) —After he is alleged to have admitted that he was the executive head of a juvenile bolshevik organization, Paul Siro, 14, president of the student body of the Captain Robert Gray high school here, was forced to resign from his school office here today.

The announcement came from A. C. Hampton, city superintendent of schools, after a conference with the boy. Hampton said that he questioned the young student body officer regarding rumors of a red movement in the high school. Hampton said young Siro readily admitted that he headed the junior bolsheviks.

Hampton said that he advised the boy that he would have to renounce the alleged radical organization or quit his high school office. The boy, Hampton said, declared that communism was his "rule of life" and refused to agree to sever his connection with the radicals. The school head will allow the lad to continue in school until the high

school board can meet and discuss the case. Who the other members of the alleged group are, Hampton said is not definitely known.
