SAVES HUSBAND FROM BANDITS

Chase by Noted Actress Made When Robbers take Spouse and Car

CHICAGO, March 24. (P)—Alexandra Carlisle Jenkins, the Alexandra Carlisle of stage fame, who in 1920 seconded the nomination of President Coolidge, dashed to the rescue last night when robbers kidnaped her wealthy husband, J. Elliott Jenkins, a radio engineer.

As she saw the men make Jenkins prisoner in his own automobile and drive away, Alexandra ran into the street, stopped a private limousine and quickly explained the situation. The obliging chauffeur took her in and started pursuit. After a dash of several blocks the rescuing wife notified the police and renewed the search.

The kidnapers, who only wanted the Jenkins automobile, sped into the northwest side. Besides the Jenkins car, the robbers had a second machine.

Jenkins was warned against resistance and assured that no harm would befall him. Finally, his kidnapers relieved him of \$16, and let him go.

When President Coolidge's name was placed before the republican national convention here in 1920 for president, Miss Carlisle rose to second it and briefly declared, "he's a real American, born on the Fourth of July." After the convention nominated President Harding, Coolidge was nominated for vice president.

Wight To Plea For Change In Road Program

Bonanza Routing to be Under Fire at Meeting

Route the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway through Hildebrand and thus create a cheaper and more direct route.

That will be the plea tomorrow morning of J. G. Wight of Hildebrand, who will appear before the state highway commission and ask that the state highway be re-routed.

The commission, according to information received here, will decide tomorrow whether or not the Dairy-Bonanza-Beatty route or the Dairy-Hildebrand-Beatty route shall be selected for the state highway.

In support of the Hildebrand road it is advanced by its proponents that it is a more direct route, and that the commission would save thousands of dollars in lesser maintenance cost.

Bonanza people hold that the state highway has already been constructed to Bonanza and that abandonment of the Dairy-Bonanza section would be useless. They state that roads should be routed to serve the greatest number of people.

It is known that state highway engineers have advocated the selection of the Dairy-Hildebrand route, and tomorrow's meeting will decide for or against the more direct Hildebrand route.

ASK ACTION ON IRRIGATION BILL

Coolidge Asked to Use Influence in Speeding up Congress

WASHINGTON, March 24. (P)—President Coolidge will be asked by a delegation of house members tomorrow to use his influence for action at this session of congress on the omnibus reclamation bill, adjusting water right charges on 13 western reclamation projects.

A dozen representatives including republicans and democrats from the west and south, and headed by Chairman Smith of the irrigation committee, will take the plea for action to the White House. The committee has approved the bill but its members fear it will be crowded out of the administration legislative program.

MURDER PROBE EVIDENCE GONE

CHICAGO, March 24. (P)—The Chicago Daily News said today that the records of the investigation into the William Desmond Taylor murder mystery were stolen last night from the hotel room of Harold L. Davis, assistant to District Attorney Asa Keyes, of Los Angeles county, California.

Keyes and Davis came from the east after a tour of investigation, declaring that an apparent development in the inquiry into the shooting to death of Taylor, motion picture director in 1922, could be expected in thirty days.
