

Brookhart To Lose Seat In Senate, Likely

Committee Decides Issue in Favor of Opponent

WASHINGTON, March 25.—(AP)—A majority of the senate elections committee voted today to recommend the unseating of Senator Brookhart, republican, in favor of Daniel F. Steag, democrat.

A minority report saying that Senator Brookhart is entitled to his seat has been prepared by Senator Stephens, democrat, Mississippi. The reports will be filed with the senate this week and the fight is expected to open on the senate floor next week, with indications that it will extend over several days.

Italian Debt Pact To Be Rammed Down U. S. Throat

Wealthy Utah Senator Defends Seven Per Cent Loan made by Morgan

Says no Comparison Possible Between U. S. Action and Private Deal

WASHINGTON, March 25.—(AP)—Chairman Smoot of the finance committee, pleaded today with the senate not to make the Italian debt settlement the "football of partisan politics," or to let its judgment be wrapped by "fervent criticisms" of Mussolini, the fascist and their policies.

Calling up the bill to ratify the settlement of Italy's war debt to this country, the Utah senator declared Italy had agreed to pay not only the principal of her debt of \$1,600,000,000, but \$800,000,000 of interest as well.

The address of the finance committee chairman, carefully prepared and bristling with statistics, marked the beginning of what has the promise of being a dramatic struggle with opponents seeking to send the bill to the foreign relations committee for further study. Proponents are confident that they can muster the votes to block that program and put the bill through.

Referring to the \$100,000,000 loan which J. P. Morgan and company made to Italy last summer at

an interest rate of seven per cent, Senator Smoot said the difference between this and the low interest rate which Italy pays to the American government "is so simple that one might suppose that no senator would stop to discuss it."

"The funds advanced by the American government were advanced during the war," he said, "the goods bought did not enrich them. They were used by Italy to fight the war."

"Italy without the new loan would not be in a position to stabilize her currency and carry out her program of fiscal and financial reconstruction. This must be accomplished if she is to live up to her debt settlements with this country and Great Britain as a despairing creditor. We should welcome the boldness of the investor who comes forward with new money to invest in Italy."

Declaring that the settlement was the best that could be made, Senator Smoot said the American people had confidence in the debt commission and in its chairman, Secretary Mellon.

"Above all," he added, "they have confidence in the integrity and judgment of Calvin Coolidge. They know that his approval of the work of the commission means that the interests of the American taxpayer have been safeguarded so far as it is humanly possible to safeguard them and that the settlements arrived at are the best that could be effected."

Mabel Normand Exonerated By L. A. Officials

Star Declared to be Nervous Wreck Due To Quiz

CHICAGO, March 25.—(AP)—Asa Keyes, district attorney, Los Angeles county, has directed Byron Fitts, chief deputy, to issue a statement that Mabel Normand, who previously had been questioned had long since been completely exonerated in connection with the Wm. Desmond Taylor murder.

Queries he planned to ask her upon his return to Los Angeles were "only of minor importance and of a general nature."

Miss Normand had declined to grant further interviews to newspapermen who besieged her following Keyes' announcement that he intended to quiz her, declaring that she already had "answered a million questions," and that it was useless to ask them again. Reports from the studio where she is making a picture were that she was highly nervous over the affair and that the repeated interviews were interfering with her work.

Some mystery was added here yesterday by reports printed in an afternoon paper that records of the case had been stolen from Mr. Davis' hotel room. Davis subsequently denied this, and explained that all important new evidence obtained in the east was in safekeeping elsewhere.

The Chicago Herald and Examiner today said that evidence so far uncovered had focused attention upon a woman well known in Hollywood, not an actress, who previously had not been under suspicion. The newspaper account related that the woman was known to have owned a small automatic pistol, was reputed to be a good shot and was said to have made threats against Taylor.

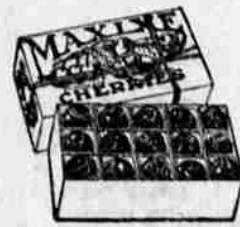

are alleged to have posed as mining promoters and the women as motion picture actresses to cover up their activities. C. E. and E. L. Weston were arrested at Anderson, Shasta county, a year ago on a charge of wholesale bootlegging, and are out on bail from the Anderson court.

Mrs. C. E. Weston, a supposed member of the gang, is in custody at Stockton, and the arrest of her brother-in-law L. E. Weston, husband of the Yreka suspect, is expected momentarily.

The male members of the gang (Special to the Herald) YREKA, Calif., March 25.—Records of the Weston gang are among the most startling in the annals of Siskiyou crime.

The band, composed of four men and five women, operated indiscriminately, taking anything that was loose and suited their fancy, officers say.

L. E. Weston, now at large, bought a coal mine near here and posed as a mining expert. He even went so far as to represent Siskiyou county at the Sacramento Mining Congress, and got away with it. His mine, authorities now believe, was used as a storage place for the band.

His suspicious aroused, Calkins went to the mine. There he found butter cartons and boxes bearing the imprint of the Montague Creamery.

He found, also, that a check for the butter had been issued to Mrs. McCrosin.

Arrest followed in short order when other evidence against the gang was placed with this, and now, with only Weston and Mrs. McCrosin unaccounted for, officers believe a long series of border crimes will come to an end.

Discovery came about as the result of a theft of 240 pounds of butter from the Montague Creamery. This butter was sold to a Yreka concern, and Sheriff Calkins, investigating, found that a man answering the description of Weston
