Plans for general enlargement and improvement were outlined for the coming year, when it is felt that an even better showing will be made.

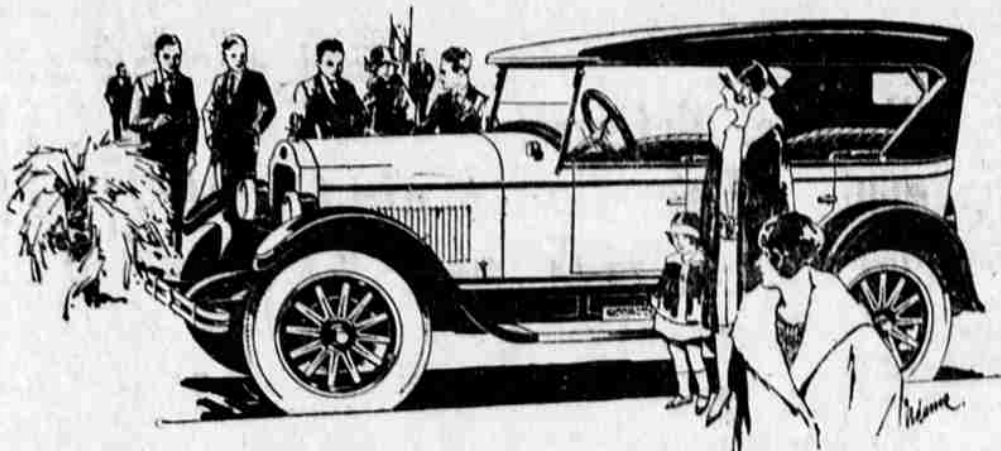
GRAB SMUGGLERS

At The Liberty

A derby hat.
Baggy trousers.
Tight waistcoat.
Spread-eagle shoes.
Trick cane.

They're all at the Liberty theater Sunday. Of course they could belong to none other than the world's greatest comedian, Charlie Chaplin.

The title of the picture is "A Dog's Life" and it deals in a screamingly funny way with the efforts of Charlie as a vagabond to get himself a farm, a wife and something to eat once in awhile. That he eventually succeeded is due in no small part to a mongrel pup, also a vagabond, that shares Charlie's gravel mattress in a vacant lot and which eats when Charlie eats. Charlie and the dog don't look so prosperous, but they do not hesitate to enter a dance hall and join in the festivities. Charlie opines that the owners can't do any more than throw them out. This they do, but the two boon companions come back with a vengeance and Charlie flashes a bank roll, which the dog unearthed in a vacant lot, that is gazed upon with wondrous eyes.

Charles Ray's feature is based upon William H. Hamby's novel, "The Desert Fiddler," and has been titled "Percy." This name serving both as a title role and an apt description of the character played by Ray, who develops into the hero of the story.

The Colorado desert was used as location for some of the episodes of the picture, but the plot has more to do with the evolution of character in a "mammy's boy" named Percival. Percy is suddenly cut loose from the maternal apron strings, thrust out into the world, and licked into shape by the rough hand of experience. These spankings jar the hero considerably, but will furnish much merriment for the audience.

"Percy" is delightful entertainment, with a new and fresh vein. Charlie Murray plays an important comedy part.

At the PINE TREE

The locale of "Quo Vadis," the new and gigantic picturization of Henryk Sienkiewicz's novel, which comes to the Pine Tree theater next Sunday, unfolds a most sensational, thrilling and dramatic story.

The scenes, varying from pagan pomp to Christian simplicity, lend the picture a powerful religious significance, as well as a love story that has become a classic.

Among the thrilling scenes is that of Ursus, in the Arena at Rome, twisting an enraged bull by the horns until its neck is broken. The hero, after killing the huge animal with his bare hands, releases his mistress, the beautiful Christian, Lygia, who had been bound to the bull's back and destined to die a horrible death.

This scene arises to a tremendous climax when Vindex, a Roman general who loves Lygia, bears her in his arms before Nero and begs for mercy. Twenty thousand of the Roman populace, jammed into the huge Circus Maximus, turn thumbs up, signifying that mercy should be granted the girl, but the emperor, whose cruelties knew no bounds, turned his thumb down. It was that final inhumanity which, as history shows, led to Nero's downfall and final suicide.

Emil Jannings, as Nero, is declared by pre-view critics to have given the most remarkable characterization of his career. Jannings is remembered for his excellent work in "Passion," "Deception" and others. Lillian Hall Davis has the role of Lygia.

PIONEER DIES

MEDFORD, Ore., March 27. (AP)—Leroy Ingram, who was born while crossing the plains to Oregon, died at his home at Central Point this morning of heart trouble aged 74 years. He was a resident of Jackson county for forty years.
