600 Students Snowbound As Blizzard Hits

Missouri Storm Stalls Two Engines With Train

CENTRALIA, Mo., April 1. (AP)—Approximately 600 Missouri university students, bound on their Easter vacations were snowbound near Hallville, nine miles south of here last night while trainmen endeavored to move five Wabash coaches and two engines.

The train bearing the students became stalled in high snow drifts late yesterday. Two engines battled the drifts unsuccessfully and at 9:30 p. m. trainmen unhooked the front engine and drove it into Centralia, leaving the rear locomotive and the coaches behind.

The students were reported as "making the best of their mishap."

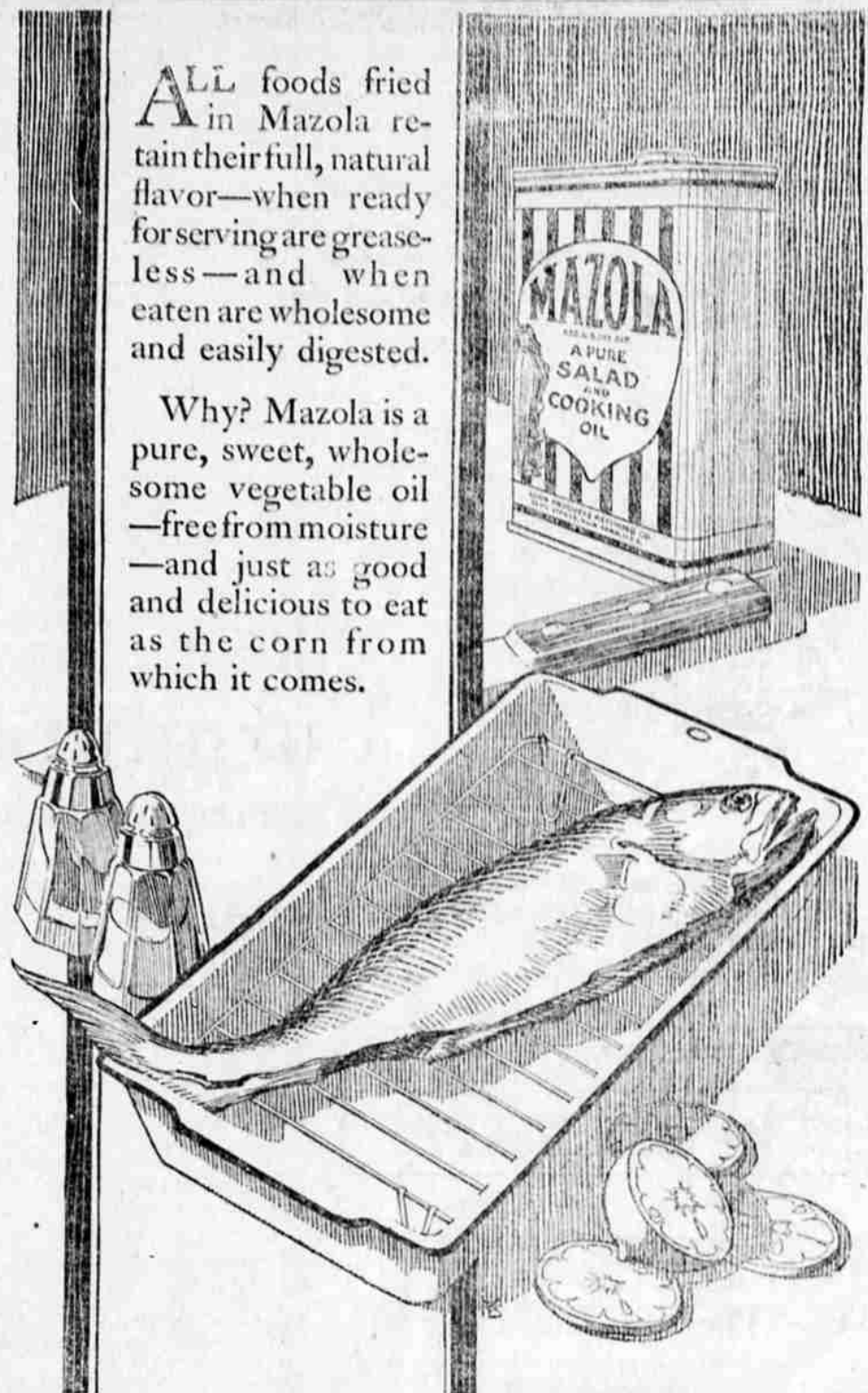
TO ATTEND BASEBALL MEET
