Decline In Wool Price
Now Believed At Pause

BOSTON, April 2. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say: "Rather wide interest in wool is reported both here and in the west this week, more especially in the west. Prices here are no better, but the declining tendency seems to have been fairly well halted for the time being, while rather better demand from some of the smaller mills is in evidence."

"In the west, buying has been more widespread, with good to choice fine and fine medium wools costing \$1 to \$1.05 and occasionally a bit more for a choice clip, clean basis, landed Boston. Grease prices for both fine and medium clips in the territory sections range from 30 to 35c according to the wool, with some heavy shrinking clips in the range of 25 to 29c."

"The foreign markets are generally firm and occasionally a bit dearer, with consuming centers moving at a moderate pace."

"Mohair is steady in the local market. Kerrville, Texas, sold four hundred thousand pounds Tuesday, at about 53c for goat hair and close to 69c for kid hair."

"The rail and water shipments of wool from Boston from January 1, 1926, to April 1, 1926, inclusive, were \$1,625,000 pounds against 45,075,000 pounds for the same period last year. The receipts from January 1, 1925, to April 1, 1926, inclusive, were 106,394,700 pounds against 90,434,200 pounds for the same period last year."

Secured basis: Oregon: Eastern number 1 staple 1.22 1/2; fine and fine medium combing 1.03 1/2; 1.10; eastern clothing 95 1/2; valley 98 1/2.

Mohair: Best combing 65 1/2; best carding 50 1/2.

DEATH CALLS
YREKA PIONEER

YREKA, Calif., April 2.—R. S. Taylor is dead.

A power in republican politics in northern California for years; prominent in legal circles throughout California, a beloved citizen of Siskiyou, the news of his death at San Francisco, Tuesday night, following an operation last week, came as a tremendous shock.

Mr. Taylor was county central committeeman for the republican party in Siskiyou for many years; he was a leader in the Siskiyou County Bar Association; he was prominent in the development of mining in Siskiyou, selling his largest holdings, the Homestake mine, in the Salmon mountains last fall; he was the principal owner in the Yreka Journal and he was always a leader in civic development in Yreka.

A wire received here yesterday indicated that Mr. Taylor's body will reach Yreka today and funeral arrangement will be made.

Mr. Taylor is survived by his widow and one daughter, Mrs. Roger Sherman, who is coming north with the body.
