

KLAMATH WILL DEFEND HONORS AT TOURNAMENT

Intersection Trap Shooting Contest Will Be Staged at Keno Tomorrow

Veteran hunters with years of experience on Tule Lake and lower Klamath lake will be called upon to defend the honors of Klamath county tomorrow at an intersection trap shooting contest to be staged at the Klamath River gun club at Keno.

Expert shots from Ashland and Medford clubs will invade Klamath with their guns tomorrow.

It will be the outstanding event of the trap shooting season. Trophies will be offered to winners and the losers and in addition there will be cash prizes.

Three events will be staged: two fifteen bird events and one 20 bird event. Two traps will be available which will carry off the events rapidly. Prizes will be awarded for the high and low gun of each event; for the high gun of all and for the low gun of all; and for the longest run.

The Lewis system will be used in conducting the tournament; that is, players will be classified as to their average. An entrance fee will be charged in order to meet the expense of the trophies and other prizes.

The shoot will start at 11 a. m. and carry on through the day.

"The Ranger of the Big Pines" is a fast, western drama of the big woods. The fighting hero role is just the kind that Harlan revels in. He makes an imposing figure and gives an excellent performance.
