

23 DEATHS IN INDIAN RIOTS

CALCUTTA, British India, April 5. (AP)—The situation was greatly improved today after the recent rioting between the Hindus and Moslems, with 23 deaths reported and many persons wounded.

The presence of the military in the streets is having a salutary effect and most of the shops which had been closed since the beginning of the riots on Friday were open today.

Assistant Police Commissioner Bannerjee, was seriously assaulted yesterday by Moslems, 44 of whom were arrested, bringing the total of those in custody to about 300. Martial law has been proclaimed.

FIRE TAKES 612 HOUSES

CAIRO, Egypt, April 5. (AP)—Thirty-two persons are dead and 4,000 homeless from a fire which raged in the Tanta district from Saturday noon until Sunday morning. The fire destroyed 612 dwellings.

SALEM, Ore., April 5. (AP)—The Salem rod and gun club upset the dope in the final shoot of a tri-city event at Corvallis yesterday, nudging out the leading Eugene sportsman for the tri-city title. When the shooting started yesterday Salem was 20 birds behind and Corvallis 24 birds behind Eugene. Figuring on a sure win Eugene sent only five men to Corvallis. Salem got 444 birds out of a possible 500, making a total score of 2742 out of a possible 3,000. Corvallis finished the series second with 2713 and Eugene third with 2528.

BALL MEETING DUE TUESDAY

MEDFORD, Ore., April 5. (AP)—A meeting will be held Tuesday at Yreka, California, with representatives of northern California towns to complete the formation of the northern California-southern Oregon baseball league. In the event that this city is unable to enter, steps towards the formation of a circuit composed of Grants Pass, Klamath Falls, Medford and Ashland will be undertaken. Sunday baseball is prohibited in Ashland, and it is proposed to have a team representing that city, play at Jackson Hot Springs, near Ashland.

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Vets' Club Is Dwindling Away

STILLWATER, Minn., April 5. (AP)—The Last Man's Club, with a roster of 24 Minnesota civil war veterans four decades ago, has dwindled to three.

Death of Emil Graff at St. Cloud, Fla., leaves but John S. Goff, St. Paul, Minn.; Charles Lockwood, Chamberlain, S. D., and Peter Hall, Atwater, Minn., to carry on for the merry group that first met here July 21, 1885.

All were soldiers in the first Minnesota volunteer infantry and annually since then members in diminishing numbers have gathered here for a banquet. A bottle of wine which has reposed in a bank vault since the first meeting will be opened by the last surviving member to toast his departed comrades.

Goff, Lockwood and Hall plan to gather here next July 21. The bottle of wine will be brought forth and placed on the festive board but not opened.
